**OFFICER SENT AFTER RUPERT**

FEDERAL CHARGE TO BE HELD IN ABYENANCE

Convict Escaped From Penitentiary at Salem, Captured in South, Admits Identity.

SALEM, July 7.—TS bring back Clyde J. "Red" Rupert, escaped convict from the state penitentiary, who was captured at Brawley, near the Mexican border, a few days ago. William Esch, former sheriff of Marion county, left for Los Angeles today. Rupert will be brought back to the penitentiary to finish his term. The federal charge against him will be held in abeyance pending expiration of his state prison term.

Rupert was taken in charge by federal officers following his unsuccessful attempt to escape from jail at Brawley and was taken to Los Angeles in an automobile. Rupert had maintained persistently that he was not the man the authorities were seeking, but at the last moment he admitted his identity and went with the federal officer without protest.

At the time of Rupert's escape from the prison life camp at Goldhill it was supposed he fled in fear of being arrested on a federal charge, because the Northwestern National bank, which he robbed of \$19,500 in liberty bonds is a federal depository.

**MILLION "DRUG FIENDS" IN U. S.**

Congress Gets Report of Investigation Conducted by Committee.

PROMPT ACTION IS URGED

Strict Enforcement of Law and Stopping of Smuggling from Canada and Mexico is Recommended.—Lack of Adequate Laws.

Washington.—The alarming spread of the narcotic drug habit in the United States is about to be called to the attention of congress in the report of an investigation conducted by a committee appointed by the secretary of the treasury.

The chief findings of the committee are:

The number of persons in the United States addicted to the use of drugs exceeds 1,000,000 at the present time.

Increase of the drug habit in the dry South leads many authorities to the conclusion that national prohibition will swell the number of victims of narcotics.

Illegal supplies of opium and other drugs are smuggled from Mexico and Canada and along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and furnished to 1,800 organized "dope" peddlers.

**Summary of Recommendations.**  
The committee's recommendations include strict enforcement of the present federal anti-narcotic act; additional federal legislation; enforcement of state laws; concerted action on the part of state and municipal governments to suppress the illicit traffic; stopping smuggling of dope from Canada and Mexico.

It is also recommended that educational campaigns be instituted in all parts of the United States for the purpose of informing the people of this country including the medical profession, of the seriousness of drug addiction and its extent in the United States, says the report.

The committee which made the investigation consisted of Congressman Henry T. Rainey of Illinois, Prof. Ross S. Hunt, Harvard university; Deputy Commissioner B. C. Keith, Internal revenue bureau, and Dr. A. G. Dumes, United States public health service.

"The number of individuals addicted to the use of opium, its preparations or alkaloids, and coca leaves, their preparations or alkaloids, in the United States has at various times been estimated to be from 200,000 to 4,000,000," says the committee. "These estimates must, however, be looked upon as mere guesses."

"Giving to the lack of laws and regulations making it compulsory for the registration of addicts, it has been impossible for the committee to obtain information which would give the exact number of addicts in the United States."

**Causes of Drug Addiction.**  
The causes of drug addiction in the order of frequency were given by police authorities as follows: Use of physicians' prescriptions, association with other addicts, prohibition, use of narcotic drugs for chronic diseases, curiosity to learn the effect of the drug, prohibition, use of patent or proprietary medicines, use of certain narcotic drugs as a stimulant, idleness, and use by dentists.

"What effect, if any, nation-wide prohibition will have on the situation could not be definitely determined by the committee," the report says. "The consensus appears to be that the number of addicts will increase as soon as the prohibition laws are enforced. This opinion apparently receives some support from investigations made in some of the southern states where prohibition has been in effect for some years."

Distinguished by W. J. This James Stewart in the famous "Hedraeos," or the Whole Art in London in 1882, tells how the wig gradually came to "declare the man." own highway, Lewiston is desirous of giving encouragement to this important highway, for the Idaho system connects at this point with the Washington system."

Full information was sent at once to the Lewiston club, which expects to give it publicity and thus awaken a realization of the importance of the through road. When Wallowa county first considered its road program, it was felt that a through highway to Lewiston and the north would be a logical result. The people of Paradise showed their interest by voting unanimously for the

boats, and Enterprise gave them a 15 to 1 majority. The government, county and state are now building a road through the 12 miles of forest on this north route by \$70,000 to \$80,000. This will improve it so greatly that it will be a good summer highway, and now and all told there is in sight probably a start has been made on it, there is no danger of its being forgotten in the future.
