THE THOUSAND DOGS

A Brussels correspondent is responsible for this: "Ten thousand dogs of war are being demobilized. They're the real dogs that aided the Allies as dispatch bearers, watch dogs and staff dogs. And every one of these dogs is honored with a military fivory bearing service scarves. Some of the dogs will go back to their owners, who loaned them for the duration of the war. A big industrial firm has asked for 300 of them. Others will stay in military service. The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will adopt the less fortunate, those recovered from wounds of battle, and will see that they have homes for life." MOUNTAIN NAMED FOR ROOSEVELT

IS ONE OF THE MOST LOFTY PEAKS IN BLACK HILLS.

Memorial Ceremony Held July 4, With Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood As Orator of the Day.

DEADWOOD, S. D., July 7.—With a sight of the country over which Theodore Roosevelt as a young man ranged his cattle and hunted wild game and just above the trails he followed while a visitor in this district, a mountain—one of the most lofty peaks in the Black Hills—has become Mount Theodore Roosevelt, in honor of the former president of the United States, "The Great American." Two tablets were unveiled.

To witness the ceremony which took place on July 4, thousands of Americans from all parts of the country came to Deadwood. Governor Norbeck, of South Dakota, presided at the ceremonies at the summit of the mountain, and Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood was the orator of the day. The arrangements were under the direction of the Society of the Black Hills Pioneers, of which Colonel Roosevelt was one of the two honorary members.

The movement to provide the memorial had its inception at a meeting of the Society of Black Hills Pioneers last January, when a suggestion of Captain Seth Ballock was made to change the name of Sheep Mountain to that of Mount Theodore Roosevelt was adopted.

Sheep Mountain, one of the highest peaks in the Black Hills and the high-

est detached peak in the chain of mountains which extends for 100 miles from Deadwood, is accessible to its summit by a broad highway, suitable for teams or automobiles, while several trails, safe and convenient for horsemen or persons on foot lead to the top of the mountain. From its summit the neighboring states of Wyoming and Montana are visible. The view from the top is unsurpassed for beauty in this section of the country.

The city of Deadwood is bearing the expense entailed by erection on the summit of the mountain of a round tower on which will be placed a bronze tablet bearing the legends telling a part of the life of Theodore Roosevelt and his contributions to American history. One of the tablets bears the following inscription: "In memory of Theodore Roosevelt, the American, October 27, 1858, January 6, 1919. Society of Black Hills Pioneers, July 4, 1919."

The other tablet pays a tribute to the services rendered by Colonel Roosevelt to his country.

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DEMOLITION ONLY TWO-THIRDS COMPLETED

According to a Washington press dispatch of June 13, the army is only two-thirds demobilized, says an announcement by the War Department. It is declared that it will take more than three months to complete the work at the present rate of 327,000 discharges a month. During the first ten days of June 110,000 soldiers were embarked from France, a new record. This announcement would indicate that war prohibition will be in force at least three months unless a declaration of the demobilization period ended in mid-June before demobilization is actually completed.
