## IRISH REPORT STUNS ENGLAND

AMERICAN-IRISH SOCIETIES MAKE CHARGES

Severe Maltreatment of Political Prisoners and Sailing of Innocent Persons Alleged

(From the Catholic Sentinel)

On June 5, Frank P. Walsh and Edward F. Dunne, representing American-irish societies at Paris, gave out their report on conditions in Ireland as they found them in a ten-day tour of this country. For some unexplained reason, says the London correspondent of the New York Herald, nothing more than a brief summary of the report was sent to America at that time. In transmitting the report to his paper the correspondent says: "The report has shaken England to the very foundation. Indeed, it has shaken her as has nothing else since she was rocked by the news of the war in the last days of July and the first of August, 1914.

The report came here from Paris early this week. Those who saw it then were stunned. Publication was withheld by the newspaper owners, who demanded that the government answer the charges and publish them simultaneously with the report. This official denial was not forthcoming, and finally the report appeared in a London newspaper. It stunned England.

The report on conditions in Ireland by Frank P. Walsh and Edward F. Dunne, gives a general review of conditions prevailing, and then makes the following specific charges:

First—Within the last few months at least ten citizens have been killed by soldiers and constables under circumstances which, in a majority of cases, the coroner's juror found to be wilful murder under the laws of England, the last one having been murdered less than a month ago. In all these cases the perpetrators of the crimes have gone unpunished.

Second—Hundreds of men and women have been confined in months in the vilest prisons without

charges being preferred against them.

Third—At least five men have died as a result of atrocities perpetrated against them while in prison. Post-mortem examinations in some cases disclosed marks of violence on the bodies.

Fourth—Prisoners are confined in narrow cells with their hands handcuffed behind them day and night. In this condition they are permitted no opportunity for answering the calls of nature and are compelled to lie in their clothing, befouled by human excrement for days at a time.

Fifth—Many persons are confined in cells which are not large enough for one man. They are not provided with beds or bunks of any kind, but are compelled to sleep on bare floors. There is no toilet facilities, and receptacles contain human offal which has necessarily accumulated upon the floors, where men are compelled to sleep in filth night after night.

Sixth—The food is insufficient and unwholesome. The prisoners, both men and women, are compelled to live days upon water and poorly baked, sour, stale bread.

Seventh—Hundreds of men and women have been discharged from jail with impaired constitutions, in many cases incurable invalids, as a result of their treatment.

Eighth—During part of the winter and spring, streams of ice-cold water were poured over the men confined in jails and they were compelled to lie all night on cold floors in unheated cells in their wet clothing. Many of them afterward were removed to outside hospitals suffering with pneumonia.

Ninth—Police men and soldiers habitually are permitted to enter cells where political prisoners are confined and bat them with their clubs.

Tenth—Solitary confinement in its most horrible form has generally been practiced. Numbers of prisoners have been taken directly from jails to insane asylums, rendered maniacs by their treatment.

Eleventh—Large bodies of political prisoners in certain jails have been kept without any food whatever for days at a time.

Twelfth—The right of privacy no longer exists in Ireland. Homes constantly are being invaded by armed men and the occupants, including delicate women and young children are cruelly beaten and otherwise maltreated.

Thirteenth—Children of suspected Republicans, many of them of tender years, are kidnapped and their parents kept in ignorance of their whereabouts for weeks.

Fourteenth—Women and children of refinement and respectability are arrested without warrants, and in company with rough brutal soldiers are transported to distant parts of Ireland and England, where they are confined in jail with the lowest prostitutes.

Fifteenth—The right to own property no longer exists in Ireland. The places of business of Republicans are invaded by soldiers and constables, the fixtures destroyed and the property confiscated without compensation. In many cases the owners of such business property have been utterly impoverished.

Sixteenth—The heads of hundreds of families have been gaoled or deported, leaving their dependent women and children without means of subsistence. These dependents are being rendered objects of public charity.

Seventeenth—Men and women, on the mere suspicion of being Republican sympathizers, are being taken from their homes or arrested in the streets or highways and deported to England, or else they are confined in goals in remote places from their homes, while their distracted families, sometimes are kept in ignorance of their whereabouts for many months.

Other men's general charges are as follows:

That the English education system in Ireland is completely broken down; that destitution and hunger and life in Dublin, that burdened with taxation and cut off from all outside commerce, Ireland is being held white.

### No Relief From High Prices Yet

RECORDS SHOW COST OF LIVING STILL RISING.

Department of Labor Statement Says Retail Price of 22 Articles Advance Two Per Cent in Month.

Ham and Round Steak each increased 2 per cent in both April and May; Sirloin Steak increased 5 per cent in April and 2 per cent in May; Rib Roast increased 6 per cent in April, and 2 per cent in May.

The above report of the Department of Labor does not apply to our market. There is no reduction in the price of Ham, but we have reduced the price of Round Steak 6 per cent, Sirloin Steak 10 per cent, and Rib Roast 8 per cent; the rate of Veal, Mutton, and Lamb have been reduced from 5 to 25 per cent.
