**LONG FIGHT IN SENATE EXPECTED**

difficult by necessary compromises. The Senate, already divided in a bitter fight over the League covenant, received the president's general and listened to his words in a grave silence. When he had concluded there was another burst of cheering until he had passed out of the chamber and had gone to his official quarters. He talked for an hour with senators who wished to seek about specific features of the treaty or of the negotiations. In these conferences the president discussed freely such subjects as the disposition of Shantung, the German indemnities and Irish freedom.

In his address, however, there was no direct reference to many of the questions around which senate debate has centered, the president declaring he could not construe details of the treaty in a short address. To Seek Details Later He did not directly mention the Monroe Doctrine, Shantung, or the obligations assumed under article 19 of the League covenant, nor did he allude to the proposal to write reservations into the ratification. He asserted a hope that he would be given opportunity to discuss details later either with the whole senate or the foreign relations committee.

**TACOMA DEMANDS STRIKE STOP**  
TACOMA, Wash., July 11.—The city council of Tacoma today instructed the city attorney to telegraph Postmaster General Burleson to meet the demands of the telephone strikers and end the strike here at once. The telephone rates here were recently raised but the wages of the employees were not materially advanced. Burleson was told.
