CARSON SOUNDS WARNING TO U.S.

SAYS IRELAND WANTS NO INTERFERENCE IN AFFAIRS.

Visit of American Mission Was a Breach of Friendship, Creating New Difficulties.

(By Associated Press to The Observer)

BELFAST, July 12.—The Twelfth of July celebrations were carried out today in Ulster on a large scale. Sir Edward Carson, the Irish unionist leader, speaking at the Orange demonstration at Hollywood, Belfast, said:

"There is a campaign going on in America fostered by the Catholic Church which will soon be joined by the Germans and their friends in order to create a great anti-British feeling.

"Heaven knows I want good feeling between America and this country. I believe the whole future of the world depends on good feeling between the United States and ourselves, but I am not going to submit to this kind of a campaign whether for friendship or any other purpose.

"I seriously say to America today, 'You attend to your own affairs. We will look after ours.' We will brook no interference in our own affairs by any country, however powerful. It is not for that we waged the great war of independence which has just been concluded. What right has an American mission to come to this country, to come here in a breach of friendship to attempt to stir up strife in matters in which they were not connected.

"The encouragement those men gave the Sinn Fein party has created for the British government far more difficulties than ever before. I believe the visit of these men and the encouragement they gave to lawlessness which is being preached throughout the land has added greatly to the campaign of assassination of innocent policemen who were only doing their duty to their king and country, and who were foully murdered on the roadside with men looking on who had no the courage to arrest the assassins, or give such information as would bring them to justice."

Sir Edward Carson denounced Sir Horace Plunkett, who he said was elected chairman of the Irish convention because he was thoroughly hated and distrusted by both sides, and added the speaker, "a nice mess he made of it."

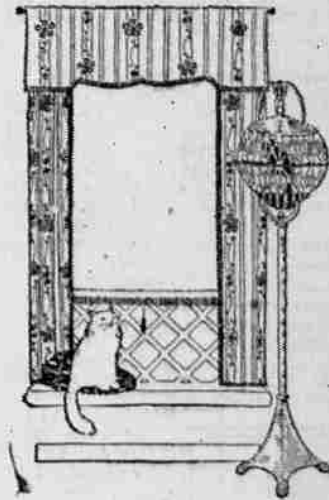

Each senatorial congressional district territory, including Porto Rico, Alaska and Hawaii, is entitled to have two cadets at the West Point Military Academy and the District of Columbia four cadets. There are also 80 appointees at large, especially conferred by the president. The law authorizes the president to appoint cadets to the military academy from among men in the regular army and National Guard, the total number not to exceed 150 at one time.

Volcanoes in Britain.
The two great centers of earthquake activity in the British Isles are Combe, in Pembrokeshire, and Mersea Island, in the mouth of the Blackwater, on the Essex coast. In both these localities earthquakes are frequent, and earthquakes are usually a sign of volcanic activity. Highly unpleasant as it would be, geologists would be no more surprised at the resurrection of one of the British volcanoes than they have been at the rebirth of Mount Elbruz.

Way of Young Sparrows.
After the young sparrows leave the nest, they gather in flocks, which, with other birds return every night to the same roosting place, writes Frank W. Chapman, in "Our Winter Birds." Sometimes this is in a dense-foliaged tree, at others in a low bush. The birds all seem to have much to say as they retreat, and chatter together in a chorus which is ordinarily hushed by the approach of darkness.
