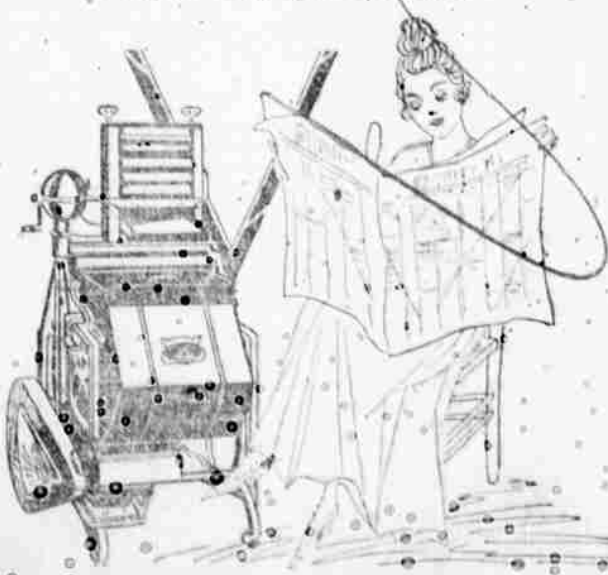

any side and left to our own resources we find that in our own country we are unwanted and in-cluded. PLANS FOR SOUTH POLE

British Manufacturers Offer to Supply Explorers With Full Equipment

LONDON, (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Two airplane manufacturers have offered to give an airplane to J. L. Cope, leader of the British Imperial Antarctic Expedition, for a flight to the South Pole. It is declared to Mr. Cope's intention to carry an airplane on board the exploring steamer Terra Nova on which his expedition is to proceed until the vessel becomes fast from the ice.

Mr. Cope is planning to be absent about six years.

Among the officers he has selected to accompany him are several who participated in previous expeditions. Professor R. C. Messman, who had been appointed Chief of the Scientific Staff, was Motorist to the Scottish Antarctic Expedition. A. H. Larkman, Chief Engineer with the Shackleton Expedition, will go with Mr. Cope in the same capacity, and Lieutenant H. H. Hooks, of the Royal Air Force, who also was with the Shackleton Expedition, has been appointed chief of the wireless staff.

Captain Husley, official photographer to the Australian Forces in the war and who accompanied the Mawson Expedition as photographer will go as photographer.

Lieutenant E. Healey, late of the Dublin Fusiliers, has been appointed a member of the shore party which will leave the Terra Nova when the vessel becomes fast in the ice, and will explore the district to the south of the Great Ice Barrier.
