### RECKLESS DRIVING OF MOTORCYCLE IS CAUSE OF DEATH

PORTLAND, July 15.—Mrs. Ethel Hughes was instantly killed and Mrs. Nora Bellman, Ralph Boden and Leroy Massey were slightly injured when a motorcycle on which these four were riding, collided with a milk wagon. Boden has been placed under arrest charged with reckless driving.

### Made Record Trip.

Capt. Klaus Larson, in his little motor boat Ferro, made a successful trip from the foot of the cataract through the Whirlpool rapids of Niagara falls on September 19, 1910. Despite the battering of the Whirlpool rapids Larson went through safely; the little boat was lost to sight most of the time, but at Great Wave it was shot 20 feet out of the water. Except the old Maid of the Mist, sent through in 1804 to avoid seizure, Larson's is the only engine-propelled craft to have gone through the rapids.

### Wedding Rings.

British Journalist Says that Usefulness Promotes Happiness Among Women

LONDON, (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Of all the sufferers from the Bolshevik regime in Hungary, the women he saw were the least unhappy, according to H. N. Brajford, a well-known British journalist.

He says that during his stay there he met a good many aristocrats who were obliged to work for the "first time" in their lives.

"Some were certainly angry," he went on, "and a few were tearful. It may have been chance, but the majority of those whom I happened to meet, especially the women, were remarkably spirited and even gay. I sat once in a drawing room in which everybody in turn began to recount his experiences in getting work. Most had succeeded. Most had met with courtesy and helpfulness. These ladies seemed amazingly proud to discover that as linguists, teachers or musicians, they had a value, and a rather high value, in the labor market.
