GAIN is already coming into the warehouses at Pendleton, Mission, Nolin and Adams, practically everything moving in sacks. The differential allowed on sacked grain makes the cost of sacking slightly more than 2 cents a bushel, so few growers will ship in bulk. Yields so far indicate that early estimates were conservative.

The Umatilla county jail is rapidly attaining hotel-like proportions, ten inmates being confined there at present.

Although of fine quality, the huckleberries are not plentiful in the vicinity of Merchan.

Attendance at the Wild West shows of July 4, 5 and 6, at Myrtle Point, averaged 500 each day, and the returns in admissions exceeded \$8000.

W. R. Reed, secretary of the Marshallfield Chamber of Commerce, has received an offer of the secretaryship of The Dallas chamber, and is considering the change.

The largest sale of farm land in the history of Wallawa county was made last week when J. N. Roberts sold his 952-acre ranch on Prairie creek to H. B. Davidhizar for \$117,000.

Although not yet 20 years old, Carl, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Houston of Hood River, has completed two years of naval enlistment and has made nine round trips across the Atlantic.

Governor Olcott has received a telegram from Secretary of the Navy Daniels, in which the latter expressed the hope that he would be able to visit Portland at the time of the arrival of the Pacific fleet.

Articles of Incorporation have been filed at Salem by the Portland & Southeastern Railway company. The capital stock is \$2,000,000 and the object is to build a railroad from Portland to Bend by way of the Waldo hills and Santiam country.

HAVE LITTLE USE FOR TRAINED DIPLOMATS

TOKIO. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The opinion generally prevailing that Viscount Ishii will not return to Washington as Japanese Ambassador, public attention is centered on the question of his successor. The Washington diplomatic post is considered by Japanese to be the most important of all.

In this connection the Herald of Asia, a leading Japanese weekly, which is printed in English, suggests that Japan adopt the American method and send a great Japanese citizen rather than a professional diplomat. It suggests the names of J. Inouye, the president of the Bank of Japan, Ito on Mitsu, Baron Iwasaki, or Baron Shibusawa, and adds: "By any one of these men the real Japan would be better represented than by some champions of its strictly trained diplomatic corps. The Americans do not much believe in or appreciate those versed in the wiles of diplomacy."

HELD AS HOSTAGES BUT GIVEN RELEASE

Let's Forces Save Lives of Those Held as Hostages by the Bolsheviks

STOCKHOLM. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The lives of several thousand persons of the middle classes at Riga were saved by the Letts when they surprised the Bolsheviks and captured the city on May 15. These people had been held as hostages by the Bolsheviks. The suddenness with which the Letts surprised the Bolsheviks prevented the Bolsheviks from murdering them. Only in one large central prison outside the city where the Letts were minutes late did the Bolsheviks have time to kill more than 100 educated persons.

This information has been brought here by Hans Franckel, who has

returned to Stockholm from an adventure trip to Riga in a motor boat to rescue some of his friends. Franckel saved thirteen persons and brought them with him to Stockholm.

He said the Bolsheviks were worse than any description could picture. Franckel had paralyzed everything and the inhabitants looked like madmen. Traces of the Bolsheviks had converted Riga into a real inferno where to be seen everywhere. Corpses were lying in the streets. The people were most pessimistic and the future looked hopeless for their pillaged city. They doubted if it could be held against the Bolsheviks unless the Allied powers gave military support.

BELGIUM HAS A JUST PROTEST

Does Not Want Germany to appropriate the Colors of Their Flag

BRUSSELS. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Belgian patriotic societies are forming to take action to prevent the German republic from adopting the Belgian national colors—black, yellow and red—for its flag. Intense indignation is manifested, and this is a bit heightened by the plea that the colors in the new German emblem will be disposed of horizontally instead of vertically.

It is generally supposed that the Belgian colors of today were chosen by the pay lots of 1830, but the revolutionists of that year merely took for themselves the black, yellow and red which had been legendary in Flanders and the Brabant since the middle ages.

The flag of Flanders bore on their arms a black lion on a field of gold, and those of Brabant a golden lion on a field of black. The trapings of both were red. From the thirteenth century therefore the Belgian colors have been black, yellow and red.

An argument against the use of the colors by the Germans is that the Belgians have actually employed the black, yellow and red horizontally in their emblems—notably in their mercantile flags—so they consider they still have a priority on that disposition of the colors as well as the vertical use. The horizontal bars were adopted by the patriots who overthrew the Austrians in 1789. In 1830, the first flag to fly from the Hotel de Ville in Brussels

was the horizontal-barred black, yellow and red.

The Belgians scorn the plea of the Germans that they have the right to yellow and red would be embarrassed use the colors because of their use by the ancient Germanic Empire, of four years to keep its colors unsullied which Austria was the center. They lied.

RECORDS SHOW COST OF LIVING STILL RISING.

Department of Labor Statement Says Retail Price of 22 Articles Advance Two Per Cent in Month.

Ham and Round Steak each increased 3 per cent in both April and May; Sirloin Steak increased 5 per cent in April and 2 per cent in May; Rib Roast increased 4 per cent in April, and 2 per cent in May.
