Owing to the shortage of water, it is impossible with the present water system to supply the daily demand now used. It has, therefore, been decided to divide the city into districts for irrigating and sprinkling laws. Beginning with this evening (Tuesday, July 15), those living in—
First Ward (South of L Avenue)—Tuesday, July 15.
Second Ward (North of L Avenue, East of Fourth Street and South of railroad track)—Wednesday, July 16.
Third Ward (North of L Avenue, West of Fourth Street to city limits)—Thursday, July 17.
Fourth Ward (North of railroad, East of Fourth Street to city limits)—Friday, July 18; every fourth day thereafter only.
No nozzle with more than one-fourth inch opening shall be used for irrigating or sprinkling purposes. This regulation is necessary and imperative for the health and safety of the city and all violators of same will be arrested and prosecuted as the city ordinance direct.
