Louisa M. Alcott's Famous Story
Picturized in Her Home at
Concord, Mass.

Filled with humor, pathos and delicate sentiment, "Little Women," the famous novel of Louisa M. Alcott which has been picturized and released as a Paramount-Artcraft special picture, will be shown at the Arcade theatre Friday and Saturday. This will be an event in which every woman and child in the city, and then many too, for this matter, who have not seen the famous story, will be intensely interested.

It is a lavender tinted picture of New England during the days of the Civil War, and its numerous home touches, its bits of romance, and its gentle pathos are as effective in the play as they were in the pages of Miss Alcott's wonderful book. Who can refrain from weeping at the pathetic death of Beth, nor marvel at the wealth of love which bound the girls to "Marmee" and father and to one another?

This splendid play is of unusual historic interest inasmuch as the scenes were filmed in and about the home of Miss Alcott in Concord, Mass., where she wrote "Little Women." Every attention was paid to the details of production by Harley Knoles, the director, and Rene Guisard, the photographer. The four little women are portrayed by Isabel Landon, Dorothy Bernard, Billie Hall and Florence Plinn. Kate Lester, Julia Harley, George Nelson, Conrad Nelson, Henry Hall and Lynn Hammond, also are in the cast.

NOTICE TO WATER USERS:

At a meeting of the City Commission held Wednesday evening, July 16, 1919, it was ordered by resolution of the Commission, that until further notice water from the city mains could be used for irrigation purposes or sprinkling lawns only as follows:

IN THE FIRST WARD (All that district lying South of L Avenue)—Saturday, July 19, 1919, and each fourth day thereafter.

IN THE SECOND WARD (All that district lying North of L Avenue, East of Fourth Street and South of Railroad)—Sunday, July 20, 1919, and each fourth day thereafter.

IN THE THIRD WARD (All that district lying North of L Avenue and West of Fourth Street)—Thursday, July 17, 1919, and each fourth day thereafter.

IN THE FOURTH WARD (All that district lying North of the Railroad and East of Fourth Street)—Friday, July 18, 1919, and each fourth day thereafter.

It was also ordered that in no district or part of the city shall water be used from the city mains for irrigating or sprinkling purposes, except between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 8:00 A. M. and 8:00 P. M. and 9:00 P. M.

Violations of this order are, under the City Ordinances, punishable by a fine and the shutting off of water.
