K. E. BERRYMAN RE-ENLISTS IN THE U. S. MARINES

K. E. Berryman of Elgin, Oregon, who enrolled in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve in January 1918, was discharged today and immediately reenlisted for two years with the regular Marines at the Marine Recruiting Station.

Berryman arrived in France in May, 1918, and was with the famous 4th regiment of the 2nd Division. He went through Belleau Woods, Soissons, Abbeville, St. Mihiel and Champagne fronts, and was wounded and wounded at Champagne. He says out of a full company that went in at Belleau Woods, he was one of twelve that was left of the company when they went in at Champagne, where the twelve were assailed by gas or wounds.

He intends to take advantage of the opportunity offered in the Marine Corps aviation section at the present time, to receive an education in one of the following trades, as an aviator, electrician, wire workers, welders, and machine shop mechanics, at the Government School at Great Lakes, Ill. Mechanics who enrolled this season during the war with qualifications allowing them to earn only \$2.00 or \$3.00 per day in civil life, are now expected and are securing positions since their salaries are from the "Duff Dogs," paying \$16 to \$12 per day.
