NORTHWEST TO BECOME ACTIVE

The Pacific Northwest must make the most of its opportunity to secure tourist travel in the few months remaining before the restrictions on travel to Europe are removed, or lose a great deal of money, in increased population and development which is within our grasp, according to Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, in a statement in which he urges commercial organizations and the agencies to advertise to the limit of their ability and to make every possible provision to take care of tourists when they come. Calling attention to the fact that restriction on European travel will be removed in January, 1920, Mr. Cuthbert urges that effort be stimulated to induce Americans to see the Pacific Northwest before they see devastated Europe. He says: "It is now that this part of the American continent should concentrate its efforts in following up the start we have made to secure and hold this traffic. We must do our part in educating the American public to the magnificent attractions of their America, especially in this portion of it. "First of all we must advertise, advertise. The battlefields have been advertised by war, by the sacrifice of our own manhood, by the heroic deed of those who died and not less by those who have returned. They are now being advertised through printers' ink, by governments, states, cities, public bodies, tourist agencies, railway and steamship companies. Hundreds of thousands of dollars will be spent in newspaper and magazine space to tell the people what there is to see in Europe. "Then in all conscience let us tell our own people by the use of printers' ink what we have to see right at home. Let us continue the work we have begun in a bigger way spending every dollar we can get hold of and as well as we know how so as to make an indelible impression and to keep pointing the fact into every American that the most beautiful land, the land that has most to see, the land which is best in all the world, is his own home land, America, and that he should see it before he sees any other. We must use printers' ink for this and lots of it—just as much as Europe will use it to tell of what she has to offer. "We must, by making traveling a pleasure, providing all sorts of conveniences, extending every courtesy and service, make the people want to see and learn more of their own home land. "Let us try to make it fashionable and a part of a person's education, to know the national parks and playgrounds, of their own country. "Carry on your good roads movement and be sure you have high ways to the limit. Rail travel always has been and always will be a most important part in tourist business, but with the millions of automobiles now in use and to come, into use in the U. S., Canada, and Mexico, the motor is a means of locomotion almost within everybody's reach and this travel will flow where the avenues permit. "Every community should publish tourist clubs or information bureaus that a visitor may be kept as long as possible in each place. Do not

depend upon publicity for everything. "The Pacific Northwest Tourist Association working in co-operation with railway and steamship lines, automobile clubs, etc., will bring the people here. See to it that when a man gets into your town he is told of all there is to see. This is the one big way to increase the value of the tourist travel. If you can persuade a man to spend three days where he only expected to stay one, you have thereby increased three-fold his value to the community. Let these tourist clubs or information bureaus be established as adjuncts to the commercial organizations wherever possible. Endeavor to provide amusement features, bathing, fishing, music, anything that will interest and amuse. People wish to be amused and the town or community that can help the visitor to spend a delightful afternoon or evening, possibly a day or two will keep him with them, otherwise he is liable to pass right through. "Good hotel accommodation, even if plain, is essential. An excellent highway, good meals and accommodation will draw motor tourists when the most gorgeous scenery may fail to do so. Make the local show places easily accessible. Let the hotel clerks and citizens generally extend the hand of good fellowship. Tell them about the other fellow's place. Praise the resorts that are near by. Be prepared to give information about what the tourist will find ahead of him and the accommodations he will be able to secure. All will help to make the Pacific Northwest popular with visitors. "Underlying all this tourist movement we should always keep at the back of our heads the idea that every tourist is a possible permanent resident, investor or manufacturer. Mayor Baker, of Portland, said what we all know to be true: that most people now in the Pacific Northwest came first to look around. When we are catering to the tourists, endeavoring to please them and to send them away with a good impression, we are sowing the seeds of a very much larger, permanent population in the future, and we never know how much capital may be brought into a district through the fact that a tourist was a keen business man with a large vision who could see possibilities of development and expansion that were not apparent even to those who were entertaining him and trying to make him feel at home."
