tees responded to the call. From the police department we have report of arrests for the week, 2 for drunkenness, 1 for disorderly conduct, 5 for traffic violations and one for smoking cigarettes. The amount of fines imposed was \$49.50 and bond fees collected \$6.40. The street force were employed in repairing cross walks, macadam streets and otherwise cleaning up streets.

The water department were busy with repairs, following delinquent water bills and making turn-ons and turn-offs. One bad leak at Greenwood and Jefferson avenue gave considerable trouble about was finally stopped. The continued dry weather and the shortage of water has made conditions very trying for the past week. As ordered by the commission the water department has endeavored to restrict water users to four hours every fourth day. With this restriction we have been able to keep the reservoir filled most of the time without pumping from the river.

The chlorination plants have been repaired and put in running order but owing to the great demand by ditch owners for water for crops in the valley the supply of water in the river is practically all taken up. If arrangements can be made with those having prior rights on the river and the Palmer Lumber company are prepared to do the necessary pumping a temporary pumping plant can be installed, sufficient water for irrigating and sprinkling could doubtless be obtained as heretofore. So far the manager and the water superintendent have been unable to make these arrangements. We would be glad of the assistance of the commissioners or any others to bring such an arrangement.

Regarding the situation at Beaver creek would say, the visit of the commissioners, special Engineer Kelsey, Mr. Boyd of the California Filter company, Engineer Hayer of the O. W. R. & N. Co., the manager, water superintendent and others on Sunday last revealed that there was still quite a supply of water much more than the pipes were taking, although the pipes were full and the water standing some fifteen inches over the intake. After looking the situation over Mr. Kelsey recommended that the intake dam be moved some 500 feet above the present one. This he stated would increase the head probably 40 ft. It was also suggested that the present intake dam be raised as much as possible temporarily to increase the flow through the pipes. At the lake it was found that although considerable fresh water was still flowing into same, algae had formed and it would be necessary to treat the water at once. This has since been done and the inlets to the lake are being cleared so far as possible of the algae growth. Up to this time it has not been necessary to take any water from the lake, the supply below the main dam being ample, as stated, for the pipes. Engineer Kelsey suggested further that it was possible sediment or gravel might have lodged in some of the low places in the pipe line and recommended that joints of

pipes be removed and examined at such places in case it was found that the line was not delivering the full amount of water it should.

The four inch meter for measuring the flow of water into the city reservoir recommended by Mr. Kelsey and mentioned in my report of last week is being installed today and we will doubtless be able to take measurements tomorrow.

As soon as Mr. Wiley can be notified of the flow he will send us instructions on what changes and improvements should be made.

At a meeting of the Union County A. C. Club Tuesday evening, July 22, 1919, the water situation was discussed at some length and although no definite action was taken by the meeting the chairman stated that he would appoint a committee to work with the city authorities in solving water problems.

A leak in the Beaver creek line at the Burdick meadow which has been giving considerable trouble was repaired last evening a second time by the water superintendent and his assistant.
