Coal production has fallen off to an alarming extent. This is due to a combination of causes. No increase in output is possible without quick action by coal consumers.

To meet the requirements of the country, production at the mines must be increased 2,775,000 tons each week!

How can this be done?

By buying your coal now. This is the only way to increase production. If production is not stimulated now, somebody will have to do it this winter.

Will it be you?

Do not think we are alarmists. The figures quoted above are accurate. They are the official figures of the Geological Survey of the U. S. Government.

Fuel Administrator, has issued a statement to the public as follows:

"Buy now—in August or the Autumn will be too late. A big coal shortage is coming. Thousands of miners are going back to Europe. Coal production has fallen off considerably and a shortage of many million tons looks probable. My advice to consumers is to buy now while they can get a selection and delivery. I feel bound to say that, as I see the situation, we are likely to experience a coal famine in the fall."
