roads is being taxed every day to carry the business that comes to them. In connection with this fact it is interesting to note that though travel restrictions necessitated by the war time conditions have been largely removed by the government, the equipment and the service to maintain them are the same. This will likely continue so until the demobilization of the army has been completed, when troops will be ready to assume their former places and purposes on the roads.

Trains come of and through La Grande are crowded every day, in both day cars and sleepers. The local traffic on the branch line to Walla Walla county points continues very heavy and the newly inaugurated evening service to Portland is very largely used by travelers to intermediate points and through to Spokane and other Washington points.

Tourists passing through from the east report that conditions are very much the same all over the country. The effect of the war strain seems to demand in people a certain amount of relaxation which they take by getting away from the office where they have been grinding hard for the past couple of years, and getting away into new country and among new people for a few weeks. Sleeping car capacity on all trains is taxed to the limit day after day, week in and week out, and it is upon the ease of the trans-continental roads that travelers must select their route not so much by their own wishes as regards the country they would like to see or the shortness of the road as by their chances of getting sleeping car accommodations.

NOTICE TO WATER USERS

At a meeting of the city commission held Friday evening, July 25, 1919, it was ordered by resolution of the Commission, that until further notice water from the city mains could be used for irrigating purposes or sprinkling lawns only as follows: Beginning Sunday, July 17, 1919, all water users residing in odd numbered houses to use water for irrigating or sprinkling on odd days of the month, and all water users residing in even numbered houses to use water for irrigating and sprinkling on even days of the month, and to use water for these purposes between the hours of 6 p. m. and 8 p. m. only. Violations of this order are, under the city ordinances, punishable by a fine and the shutting off of water.


