BAUER OF AUSTRIA QUITS CABINET JOB

VIENNA (By the Associated Press)—Dr. Otto Bauer, Austrian foreign minister, resigned the foreign portfolio Saturday. He retained, however, the post of minister of socialization in the cabinet. The foreign ministry will be taken over by Dr. Karl Renner, the chancellor, in addition to the chancellorship. Representatives of the allied powers as well as Austrians of the well-to-do order, are said to have been attempting for months past to bring about Doctor Bauer's resignation because of his supposed Bolshevik affiliations.

FORT LEE, N. J., (A. P.)—Forty persons were injured, 17 seriously,

when two trolley cars of the Public Service corporation, both loaded with passengers, met in a head-on collision on top of the Fairview near an amusement park Sunday.

AUSTRIA ASKS ALLIES FOR TIME EXTENSION

ST. GERMAIN-EN-LAYE (A. P.)—Dr. Karl Renner, Austrian chancellor and head of the Austrian peace delegation arrived here Saturday from Feldkirch, near the Swiss border, where he conferred with Austrian government representatives from Vienna. Doctor Renner at once formulated a request to the peace conference for an extension of the time accorded Austria to reply to the second part of the peace terms, communicated July 20. The Austrians were originally given 15 days within which to make reply.

AVIATION LEGISLATION ENDED

HOUSTON, Tex., (A. P.)—Lieut. Francis M. Bryan of Morriston, Ark., an Ellington field pilot, was instantly killed, and Pvt. Will Ponick of Holland, Texas, member of a recruiting detachment, was seriously injured when an airplane in which they were flying fell here Sunday.

SENATOR WALSH FAVORS LEAGUE

WASHINGTON, July 27—Senator Walsh, Democrat, Senator from Montana, denied in a speech here that Article Ten of the Covenant would handicap the cause of Irish freedom or fix the internal boundaries of nations. He said that it clearly meant for members of the league to protect each other from external aggression.
