MINNEAPOLIS HOST TO EDITORS—MINNEAPOLIS, (A.P.)—Two hundred editors, representing 37 states of the union, were guests of this city Sunday. SEATTLE STEAMER BURNS.—VANCOUVER, B. C. (A.P.)—The wooden steamer Admiral Knight, 600 tons, of Seattle, was burned to the water's edge on the coast between Vancouver and Victoria Sunday. The blazing ship attracted the attention of the steamer Princess Victoria which picked up two of the ship's boats filled with members of the crew and then removed from the deck of the burning vessel Capt. L. J. Allen and several other seamen. One fireman was severely burned. The Admiral Knight was enroute from Seattle to Alaska points. She carried no passengers.

ON WAY ROUND U. S. RIM.—FRESNO, (A.P.)—Four army aviators who left Ellington field, Texas, July 10, on a flight which was expected to take them nearly around the United States, were here Monday en route from March field, near Riverside, California to San Francisco.

The aviators followed the Mexican border from Texas to San Diego. They expected to continue up the Pacific coast to Seattle, Washington, and thence across the continent to New York, returning to Ellington field by way of the Atlantic and Gulf.

THREE BOMBING PLANES WRECKED AT MINOROLA

Two men who were in the steel hangar at Hazelhurst field when it was struck by a bolt of lightning miraculously escaped when the roof collapsed. In this hangar was the Martin bomber commanded by Capt. Francis, a Caproni triplane, and two DeHavillands. The Martin and Caproni were virtually destroyed.
