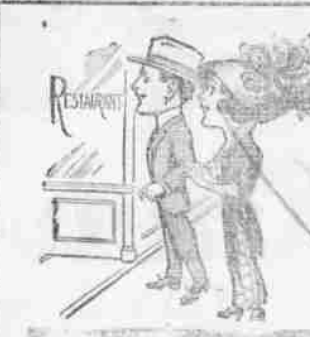

NOTICE TO WATER USERS. At a meeting of the city commission held Friday evening, July 25, 1919, it was ordered by resolution of the Commission, that until further notice water from the city mains could be used for irrigation purposes or sprinkling law only as follows: On Sunday, July 17, 1919, all water users residing in odd numbered houses to use water by rotation or sprinkling on 100 days of the month, and all water users residing in even numbered houses to use water for irrigation and sprinkling on 100 days of the month, and to use water for these purposes between the hours of 6 p. m. and 8 p. m. only. NEW YORK, July 30.—The house committee, headed by Royal L. Sisk, of South Dakota, which has been investigating cruelties of the German military prison camps in Europe, today turned their attention to the destruction of American airplanes under direction of army officers.

HOT STUFF GOES ON ROAD TODAY

WORK IS WELL ALONG ON THE ISLAND CITY ROAD. Is the First Bath of Bitulithic to Be Applied On Union County Highway.

The Island City-La Grande road, on which the preparatory work for hard-surfacing was started some time ago, got its first hot bath of bitulithic today. The Warren Construction Company, who are handling the job, have their heating plant, in which the asphalt mixture is prepared, located near the La Grande Iron Works, and the mixture is carried to the road by motor trucks. The hard surface will be applied sixteen feet wide.

BATTLE FOR LITTLE BOY

INCIDENTS OF AN OLD CASE RECALLED BY CALIFORNIA COURT ORDER.

CHILD TURNED OVER TO PROBATION OFFICER

Mrs. Grace Selig Recovered Possession of Six-Year-Old Son in La Grande Two Years Ago—Child Afterward Forcibly Taken By An Aunt at Telocaset.

MODESTO, Calif., July 30.—The superior court today ordered six-year-old Loxelle Brannon to be turned over to a probation officer. This is the climax of a four-year battle for the boy between the child's aunt, Mrs. Bertha Mordvie, and his mother, Mrs. Grace Selig, who gave the child to the aunt in order to keep its birth a secret.

Two years ago the mother gained possession of the child at La Grande, but the aunt regained the little boy at the point of a gun at Telocaset and then Mrs. Mordvie fled with the child to California. A fight for his possession has been on since that time, culminating in the order of the California court today.
