REAL WIRELESS OUTFIT USED IN NEW HART PHOTOPLAY

More is Employed in New Art Picture, "The Border Wireless."

In William S. Hart studio at Hollywood, a complete and practical wireless outfit was erected for use in scenes of his new Artcraft picture, "The Border Wireless," which will be shown at the Arcade Theatre Friday and Saturday.
