NAZIMOVA IN POWERFUL PLAY "OUT OF THE FOG"

Screen Play Adapted from "Ception Shoals," Shown at the Arcade Theatre.

"Out of the Fog," the screen masterpiece of which the great Nazimova is the star, will be specially shown at the Arcade Theatre Wednesday and Tuesday. La Grande People Have Unusual Experience on Visit in the East.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Holm, who left La Grande by automobile several weeks ago, to visit in the east, have had unusual experiences which are recounted in a letter from Mrs. Holm. They were in Fergus Falls just after the cyclone had struck the place. The cyclone came from three directions and covered a territory thirty-five miles wide and seventy-five miles long. The residence part of Fergus Falls looks like a pile of kindling wood, but the business section fared better. The J. C. Penney store at that place had its front destroyed. The home of a friend was struck and was almost completely demolished. People whose property was destroyed cannot recover insurance as they had to have cyclone insurance to cover

such losses. Not all the dead had been buried at the time Mrs. Holm was visiting the home of her friend at Fergus Falls.

Montana has been shipping out stock because of the lack of water and feed. The western part of North and South Dakota is dry and dead, but further east there are good crops.
