Arrests More Numerous This Year—

Records at the city hall of the police department activities during the month of August this year and last year show that thirty-two arrests were made this year, as against seventeen last year. The extra stringency with which the force is enforcing traffic regulations likely accounts for much of the increase, as twenty-one of the arrests last month were those of offending motorists. \$3500 in fines was collected during the first six months of 1919, where only \$1900 was collected from wayward ones during the first six months of 1918.

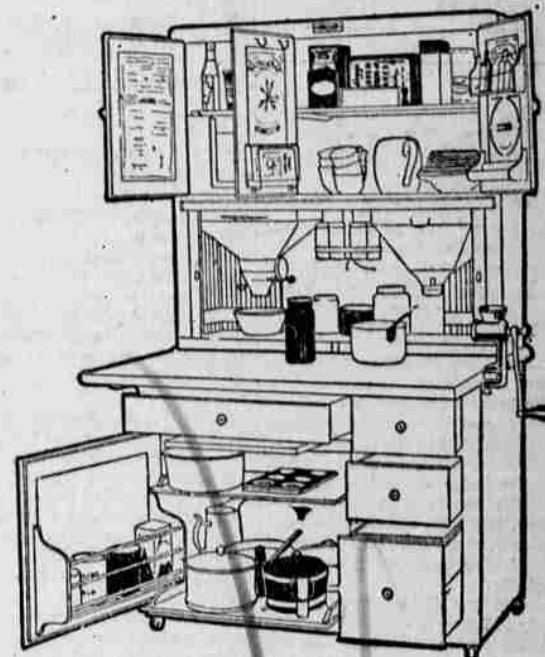
Ups and Downs of Life.
