Friday night this week, August 15, has been arranged as the date of the match between Mike Howard, the local heavyweight, and John Freberg, of Chicago, who challenged Howard to a match last week, stating that he would undertake to down him twice within one hour and thirty minutes of wrestling time. Howard, or Harold Christensen, as many know him, is recognized as being a mighty fast man and though Freberg is said to exhibit mar-

They are both genuine top-notchers in the wrestling world, and with the challenger allowing himself a comparatively short period to win his match there is a guarantee that the whole go will be lively. Tickets are selling at very popular prices.

Mr. Anderson announced on his return from Boise yesterday that he was practically certain of having Marin Plestina come here for a match the night of Labor Day, and he expects to have the winner of Friday night's contest go on with this noted wrestler. Plestina is heralded as the real champion heavyweight of the world, who is only kept from having officially proclaimed champion by the tactics of the four men, Caddock, Lewis, Stecher and Zbyseco, whom Bernarr McFadden, editor of the Physical Culture Magazine and advocate of clean sports, charges with having formed a combine to keep the championship among themselves. McFadden has interested himself in Plestina and has repeatedly tried to get him a chance at the championship, but without success. Failing that, he arranged a match between Plestina and the Canadian, Jack Taylor, Pacific Coast champion. The match, held in Madison Square Garden, New York City, was witnessed by thousands.

A match between Plestina and either Freberg or Howard would be an unusual attraction here and would undoubtedly bring hundreds of fans from around the country to witness it.

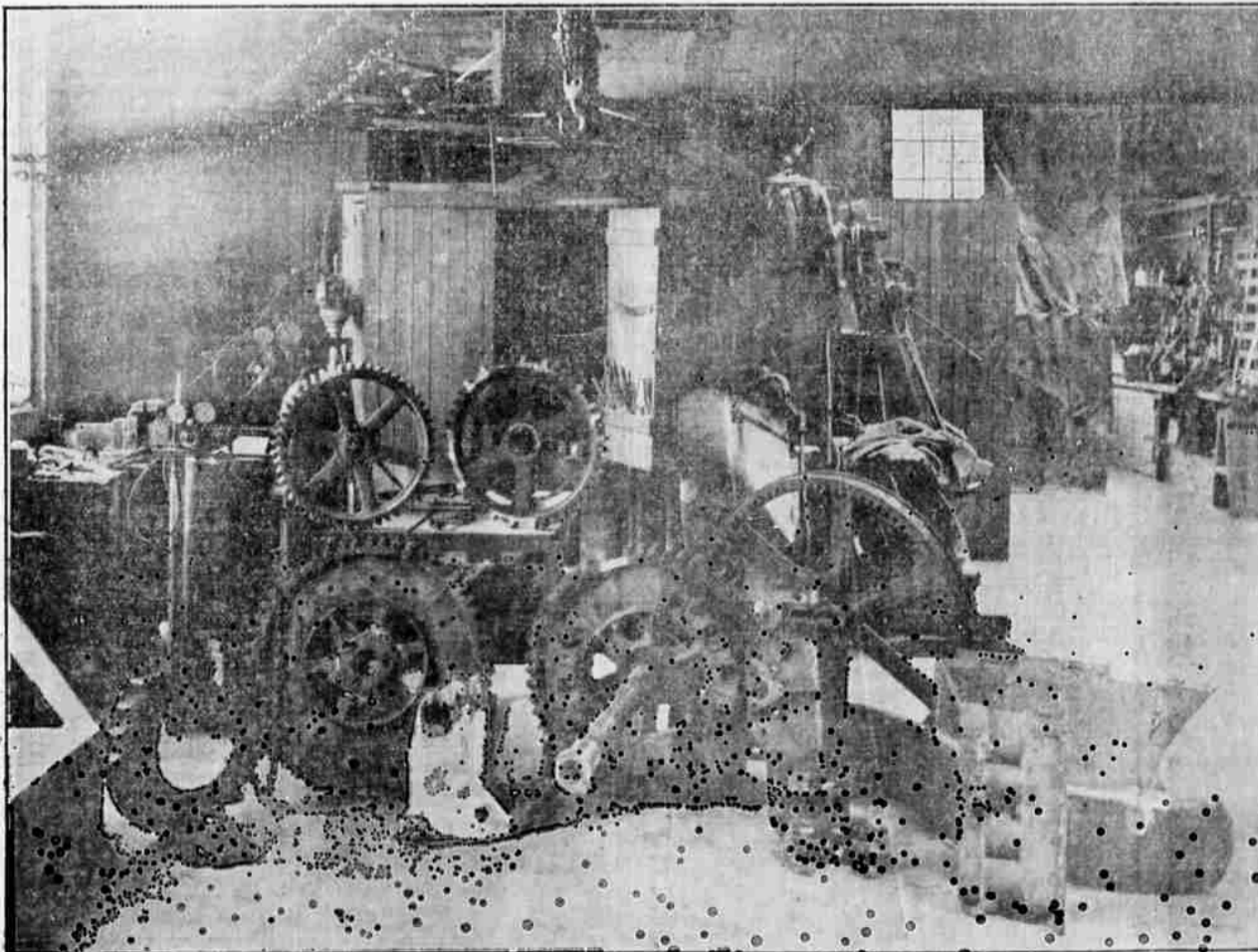

Welding Jobs At The Leighton Garage



R. W. Leighton, of this city, estimates that already this year his oxy-acetylene welding apparatus has saved Union county fully \$50,000, through repairs he has been able to make on damaged machinery, thus saving the owner the greater expense of buying new parts to replace broken ones. There is a picture which shows several jobs of welding brought into his shop, the various pieces being worth in the aggregate \$400. They all were repaired at a total cost of less than one-third that figure. The owner got just as good a part as he had before the accident which broke it and in addition did not have to pay the cost of a new piece and the heavy transportation costs.

In the wheel at the left in the upper row in the picture, three teeth were welded in the eye just beside the nine broken teeth were replaced. The new teeth can be distinguished by their white appearance. At the left in the lower row is a ratchet wheel from a donkey engine out of which a large piece was broken and can be plainly seen. This piece was replaced and made stronger than ever. The second piece is a friction wheel of a donkey engine. The five heavy spokes holding it through in the center of it were all broken, and the picture shows clearly the marks when they were welded together again. In front is a Maxwell transmission case, showing the hole where the reverse gear broke out. Next is another donkey engine friction wheel showing one tooth to be replaced, and beside it is a casting from a steam engine. With the corners broken off the big wheel behind is the gear wheel of a combine thrasher, which had a broken spoke. Oxy-acetylene is used in the left hand corner is a Ford engine block, with a crack in the water jacket remedied by welding, and beside it a tender which has had Mr. Leighton's attention.
