Demonstration of the Food Value of Milk

The Oregon Dairy Council will have an educational exhibit at the state fair. Plans for the exhibit are being made by a committee headed by W. K. Nowell, former food administrator, now with the U. S. Grain corporation. The display will show the food value of milk and its products. La Grande is represented on the council by the Pioneer Flouring Mills.

California has watched the work of the council with interest and is getting ready to make a milk survey in the schools along the same lines as the schools used in Portland. La Grande will be asked to make this survey which is a very simple affair but determined how many children are getting no milk, how many get a glass a day and how many, a pint or more.

The Oregon Dairy Council is cooperating with the National Dairy association in advancing the cause of the National Dairy Show to be held this fall in Chicago.

Many novel, entertaining and instructive features, provided especially for the Milk Producers of the

country, should go far towards making the National Dairy Show at Chicago this year an event that all milk producers, together with the members of their families, should decide they cannot afford to miss under any circumstances.

There are, of course, many features that usually attract the attention of the Milk Producers at the National Dairy Show and such features will be in evidence this year as always.

In addition, Milk Producers this year will be asked to participate in cattle judging and milk contests. Wives, sons and daughters of the dairy men will also be given the opportunity of showing their progress in field contests.

There are other things that should determine Milk Producers to be in Chicago in October for the big show. The United States Government is calling all dairy men to Chicago at that time to receive very important post-war messages on the dairy conditions of the world after the war. The messages that the Federal Government have to deliver are of

paramount importance to every man, woman and child connected in any way with the great dairy interests of the country. These messages will be delivered in a manner that cannot fail to impress and convince; they will be graphically delivered; they will show dairy conditions as they are. Congress has appropriated \$25,000.00 for the purpose of enabling different Governmental Departments to make exhibits and demonstrations at the Dairy Show and it is assured that these exhibits will be of a character never before shown anywhere.

A post-war information bureau on dairy conditions will be established under the supervision of the Federal Government at the Show and the Department of State has formally announced this fact to all foreign governments and has asked them to send delegations and commissions to Chicago for the exchange of ideas and information on dairying.

Cow Test Association cows will be brought into competition from all of the states during the Dairy Show. Boy and Girl Judging Contests of champions from all states that are doing a work for the boys and girls will be held. The work of the Boy and Girl Calf Club will also be shown.

Men and women from the dairy farms will be keenly interested in the Children's Welfare Work, the Cattle Exhibit and Auction Sales of Breeding Cattle will afford an idea of cattle values that will be of inestimable value to dairy men.

The government and the National Dairy Association both ask for a big attendance of farmers at the coming show that a full knowledge of the great work they are engaged in may be advanced for the good of the whole world.

The date of the National Dairy Show this year on October 6th to 13th, inclusive. The time is convenient for Milk Producers and the Show is easy to reach in Chicago.

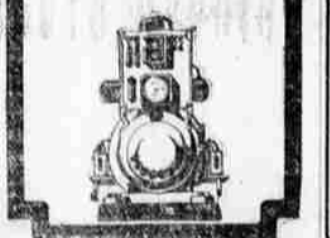

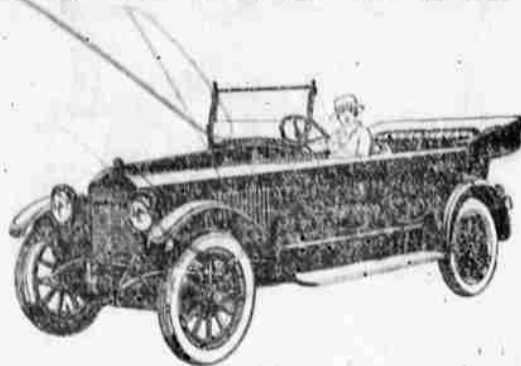
