RECORD APPLE PRICE PAID

WALLA WALLA, Wn., Aug. 10.—Thomas Jones, of the Russell creek section, last week sold 5000 boxes of apples to the Lamb Fruit company of Freewater for \$1.70 a box. Jones is to pick the apples, but the company will sort and pack them and furnish the boxes. This is the highest price yet paid here for apples.
