MEMORIAL FUND WORK IS BEGUN

STATE COMMITTEE IS ORGANIZED FOR CAMPAIGN

\$10,000,000 Memorial Fund for Perpetuating the Memory of Theodore Roosevelt Will Be Raised

William Boyce Thompson, of New York City, president of the Roosevelt Memorial Association, has appointed Dr. Henry Waldo, of Portland, as chairman of the Oregon State Committee to co-operate with the National Committee in a nationwide campaign...

The purpose of the campaign is to raise funds for the erection of suitable monuments for the perpetuation of the memory of Theodore Roosevelt, the great American.

The fund is to be expended in erecting a monumental memorial in Washington D. C., the one city which belongs to all Americans and which was so long the scene of Roosevelt's great labors for public welfare.

The memorials are to be the gifts of the nation, the tribute which so many thousands of men, women and children have so ardently desired as a means of expressing their recognition and appreciation of the ideals and noble teaching for which Theodore Roosevelt lived.

A regional conference, embracing the committees from the states of Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho, will be held at the Lafayette Hotel, Portland, Oregon, Monday, August 18 at 10:30 a. m., at which meeting a member of the National Committee will be present.
