TO WORK IN ARMENIA.

The Rev. W. E. Rambo and Mrs. Rambo, of Baker, Ore., have been selected as members of a small group of workers who will sail from New York for Armenia, September 26. Mr. and Mrs. Rambo were selected by the American committee for Armenian and Syrian relief because of their long experience as missionaries under conditions similar to those faced in Armenia and Syria.

Rev. Mr. Rambo and Mrs. Rambo are both ordained ministers. For 13 years they were in India, where Mr. Rambo established the Damoh orphanage.

They will engage in some phase of educational or industrial work in Armenia. The orphanage problem in Turkey is now engrossing the attention of the American committee.

\$10000 WILL BE PAID FOR SINGLE WORD

World Trade Club Offers Prize for Best Name for "Brit-Am."

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—Can you create the one word which will best denote the United States and all parts of Britannia? If so, you will be paid at the rate of \$1,000 per word. The World Trade Club of San Francisco has offered \$1,000 to the person who suggests the word which, in the judgment of the club's Metric Campaign Committee, is best adapted to world-wide use.

The competition is open to all humankind. The money will be paid to the winner at noon on 15 of May, 1920, by a committee appointed by president W. H. Hammer of the World Trade Club.

"Brit-Am," "Ambria," "Ambrittica," "Br-Am," "Sam-Bull" are some words thus far suggested. New names are constantly coming. The World Trade Club is offering this award because in carrying on its present campaign for the adoption of metric units by all English speaking people—the United States, the British Isles, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Tasmania, United South Africa and so

on.—It was hampered by the lack of a single short word which would express all these.

The metric units of weight and measure are now used by all the world except "Brit-Am" or "Am-Britica" or "Sam-Bull."

Four L's Meetings to Be Held; La Grande's Date Is August 30th

District conventions of the Loyal Order of Loggers and Lumbermen will be held during this month at designated places in Oregon and Washington. The meetings will be attended by delegates representing 40,000 members of the organization. The business to be considered is the further improvement of working conditions on the basis of an eight-hour work day and to stabilize wage scales for employees of logging camps and saw mills. The convention of district No. 2 will be held in Portland commencing Thursday morning, at Woodmen hall Eleventh and Alder streets. District No. 3 convention also will be held in Portland, commencing August 26. Other conventions announced by P. L. Abbey, secretary-manager of the legion are of operations and employees, are District No. 1, August 15, Eugene; district No. 4, August 19, Coquille; district No. 5, August 20, Aberdeen; district No. 6, August 22, Tacoma; district No. 7, August 23, Seattle; district No. 9 and 10, September 6, Spokane; district No. 11 and 12, August 30, La Grande.

The family which consisted of the father, mother and two small children, had just finished their noon meal and gone across the river to the company's store when the fire broke out and the tent, their trunks and all their clothing were destroyed. Nothing was saved except a go-cart. The fire spread rapidly up the mountain but soon died down owing to the

trees being so scattered.
