### WILD WING POLAROIDER IN AUTO ACCIDENT.

Injuries Will Not Interfere With Attendance at Pendleton Show?

PENDLETON, ORE., Aug. 15.—Bob Hall, of La Grande, a Pendleton Round-Up performer, thought he would be among the missing this year when his machine overturned in the Cascade River canyon, near Myrtle Point, in Southern Oregon, throwing him over the brink of a 100 foot sheer the stream's bed. His speedy descent toward the rocks below was halted by a log, 35 feet below the road. Two of the six in his car went to the river bed, being stopped there by sharp rocks which broke one shoulder blade and delivered several ugly lacerations.

After taking stock of his crew, Hall found that two were injured and his car badly smashed but he himself was unhurt but for a few bruises. "It was more ticklish than my Round-Up stunts" he said when he went through Pendleton.

Hall declared that he would be here for this year's Round-Up September 15, 19 and 20, with his horses and ready to give 'em all a run for their money.

### Police Gazette Belt For Champion Cowboy at Pendleton Round-Up

PENDLETON, Aug. 14.—One more trophy for Roundup contestants to strive for is offered through a message from the Police Gazette, national sportsmen's weekly magazine, to the effect that the Police Gazette belt, awarded annually to the world's champion all-around cowboy, would again be offered this year. The belt has been put up by the Gazette each year since 1915.

The Police Gazette belt is of gold and silver and is awarded on points. The cowboy who wins it must have been entered in at least three events and the high point winner takes the belt. The Gazette, in offering the belt this year, notified the association that it looks on the Roundup as the world's greatest wild west show.

Mayor General Palmer, speaking for the Democrats and others regarding the speech of United States Senator Lodge, voicing the sentiments of the Republicans, will be released. They speeches will be reproduced at club societies, lodges, churches, Monday meetings and in the homes of the party workers.

Following the release of the speeches of Attorney General Palmer and Senator Lodge, other records will be distributed monthly and it is expected that the meeting places and homes throughout the country will furnish add records with the words of the orators as conveyed by means of talking machines. The extent of the part which phonographs may play in the campaign can be estimated by the statement that two manufacturers of the machine are known to have more than 2,000 phonographs in use in the United States.
