Control of the First National Bank

Control of the First National Bank of Joseph was bought last week by Fred W. Falconer and on Tuesday the shareholders met and elected the directors, who then named the officers, reports the Enterprise. The officers and directors are: F. W. Falconer, president; C. L. Hartshorn, vice-president; J. N. Swainwood, cashier, and S. A. Blyvans, J. O. Marks, J. W. Warner and A. K. Parker.

Mr. Falconer is also president of the Enterprise State bank, of which Mr. Parker is cashier. Mr. Parker formerly was cashier of the First National of Joseph, but came to Enterprise last winter when Mr. Falconer bought control of it. Mr. Falconer is also director in the Stockgrowers and Farmers National bank of Walla Walla.

The directorate of the First National bank of Joseph before the recent change was L. Knapper, L. E. Caviness, J. P. Averill, C. L. Hartshorn and D. W. Warlock. So the retiring directors and stockholders are: L. Knapper, who formerly was president, Mr. Caviness and Mr. Averill in connection with his sale of his bank stock. Mr. Caviness also disposed of his home in Joseph. He declined to let the stock go unless the house also was taken.

Mr. Falconer was out of town when the bank stock changed hands last week. There had been considerable negotiations between him and the owners of the stock, and last Monday night several of them drove to Enterprise to make a proposition. They met Mr. Parker, who was familiar with Mr. Falconer's plans and ideas and he told them he was ready to deal at once. They then drove back to Joseph where the stock was taken from the bank vaults and handed over and paid for. The next day Mr. Falconer received a telegram from Portland advising him that he had bought the bank. He hurried home and completed the reorganization, which took final form at Tuesday's meeting.

Grass Fire Calls Brigade

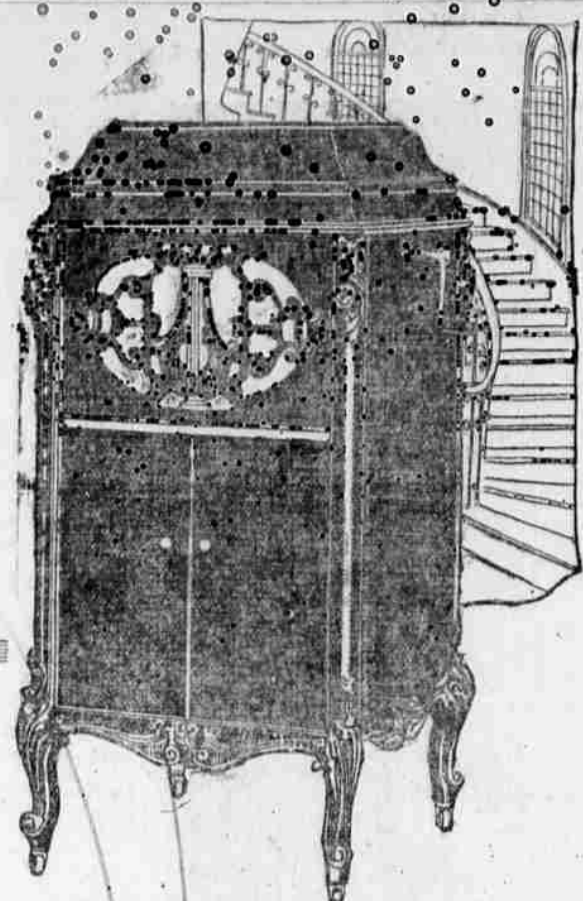
A grass fire at the corner of Second street and N called the brigade out at noon yesterday. A few minutes work with the chemical apparatus was sufficient to squelch the flames.
