Accomplice to Auto Theft Arrested—Harry Wilson has been arrested, charged with aiding Earnest Danna in the attempted theft of the Hal Bohnenkamp car.

Wilson, who is only 14 years of age, says that when he last saw his father was in Sacramento and that his mother is dead. He has been traveling from city to city and has been in San Francisco, Portland and Seattle. He arrived in La Grande about twelve days ago, just about the time that the car began to be stolen, and since that time the police are sure that he has been connected with at least five auto thefts. He has confessed to taking the Ford car belonging to Victor Eckley as the police took him out to the place where the car was abandoned and a woman there of whom young Wilson had asked for oil, identified him as the person who left the car.

The boy was well prepared to take autos for he had in his possession at the time of the arrest a key to a Hupmobile belonging to a La Grande car and a key to a Ford. The owner of the Hupmobile has identified the key.

Wilson beat his way into La Grande and since his arrival has been sleeping in a barn. He is at present lodged in the city jail while the Danna boy is released and is at home with his mother.
