Father of the Typewriter.
Just 100 years ago, Christopher Latham Sholes, the "Father of the Typewriter," was born in Pennsylvania. While serving as collector of customs, he became interested with two other inventors in the problem of making a machine that would write letters and words. A letter written on one of the early machines attracted the attention of a capitalist, who provided funds, and Mr. Sholes continued improving the model until at last the first practical typewriter was put on the market.

Calculating Feet in Knot.
The British admiralty knot or nautical mile is 6,080 feet and the statute knot, 0.00209 feet and is generally regarded as the standard. The number of feet in a statute knot is arrived at as follows: The circumference of the earth is divided into 360 degrees, each degree containing 360 knots or (360 by 60) 21,600 knots to the circumference; 21,600 divided into 131,285,456, the number of feet in the earth's circumference, gives 0.00209 feet, the length of the statute knot.
