NOW IS THE TIME TO SPRAY ORCHARDS

CORVALLIS, Aug. 23.—If Oregon fruit growers are to protect their apples and pears from the attacks of codling moth worms that injured 15 to 80 per cent of their fruit last year they will have to have 35 protective coats of poison on the fruit when the worms emerge for the September "falling." This spray, says A. L. Lovett, station entomologist, should be applied August 29 to 25 in the Willamette valley and similar districts.

The solution recommended by Professor Lovett is 3 to 3.1-2 pounds of powdered lead arsenate—twice as much paste—to 100 gallons of water. Every apple and late pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray. Early pears will probably not need the spray unless they are to be left on the trees until well into September.

Liberty H. Bailey, the county's most noted agricultural investigator and educator, has been invited to speak before the farmers' week evening audiences, and has indicated that he will accept the invitation. The date for farmers' week has been set for December 29 to January 3.

Six graduates of O. A. C. or students duly qualified are eligible for election to the Rhodes scholarships at Oxford, England. No entrance examinations are required for graduates, but the latter will have to fulfill the requirements in Greek for the A. B. degree. All applicants must first obtain the endorsement of the college.

Three special trains will arrive in La Grande, on Tuesday, Aug. 27. Aboard will be the paraphernalia and equipment of the Carl Haggenbeck and Great Wallace Shows Combined, which is scheduled for two performances.

The circus special will arrive thirty minutes apart according to the schedule given out yesterday by the railroad officials.

It will probably entertain large crowds of visitors here. All railroads entering the city have made preparations for handling a large increase of passengers. Visitors will come in many ways, according to reports. Some will come aboard automobiles, others in carriages, and others will ride horseback, while not a few will walk. But they will get here just the same.

Agents who have been in the city the past week have made their final preparations. As quickly as the circus specials arrive they will be parked in the railroad yards and the work on unloading will begin. There promises to be no halts or perplexing delays. Everything around a big show is done with system. Each man has a special task to perform, and in held directly responsible for it. He performs the same task day after day and in time becomes wonderfully proficient.

The first wagon to be unloaded will be the enormous kitchen van. It contains sixteen feet of steel cooking space and upon it is prepared all the meals for the circus followers. While the space is necessarily small, yet it is compact.

It requires sixteen separate tents to house the Haggenbeck-Wallace shows. There are the cook house tents, stables, four of them, blacksmith tent, harness tent, saddle show tents, the menagerie tent, which houses several hundred rare and costly animals and the big arena tent which comfortably seats many thousands of spectators. This mammoth tented palace is the largest arena pavilion ever constructed. It required three months to complete the task. It is valued at a small fortune alone.

Probably one of the most interesting little tents is the "top" which houses the barber shop. Here may be seen the regulation barber pole of red, white and blue. On the inside the circus tonorialist wields his razor. Time is a valuable asset to the showmen and they are ever ready to resort to time savers. It often happens that they can not find time to run down town to get their daily shave, and hence the little barber shop.

The Haggenbeck-Wallace Circus, grounds in La Grande will form a little city all in itself. There is a lawyer, a dentist, a doctor, 1000 veterinarians, a minister of the Gospel, the Rev. Cadmus Pope, D. D., half a dozen blacksmiths and harness makers, besides a whole corps of bookkeepers and stenographers.
