BAPTIST YOUNG FOLKS TO MEET

STATEWIDE GATHERING TO BE HELD AT GLADSTONE PARK.
PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—The first annual assembly of the Baptist young people of the state will be held August 29 to September 1, on the Gladstone Chautauqua grounds near this city. Harold K. Halgren, state president, announced. The purpose of this summer institute will be four-fold—educational, devotional, inspirational, and recreational.
The names of several leading Pacific Coast Baptists appear on the program. Among them are Dr. W. B. Hinson, Dr. O. J. Wright, Dr. Alonzo M. Petty and A. S. Bosserman, all of Portland; Dr. T. H. Hagen of Seattle, Miss Mabel Hines and Roy W. Earle South of Los Angeles, and Howard J. Hunter, president of the Grand Rapids association.
The informal opening will be Saturday afternoon, followed by a state B. Y. P. U. rally in the evening. Sunday will commence with a sunrise prayer service, followed by morning worship, afternoon intermediate rally and an address by D. Hinson, and in the evening the B. Y. P. U. service and an address by Dr. Smith Monday morning will be devoted to conference, the afternoon to business and a recreational period and the closing evening session will be addressed by Dr. Petty.
Camping facilities have been provided. Tents and meals will be obtainable on the grounds at cost. Four Ministers and their wives have been invited to act as "camp advisers." While this institute is being held by the Baptist young people, anyone will be welcome at the services.

From the Recorder's office, Licenses issued: dray 1, cab 1, rooming house 1, taxi 3. Receipts from fines 7.50, pound 1.00. Warrants issued, work fund \$81.25.
From the Fire Department, four calls for fires; one to Second and Main on account of fire in an automobile caused by defective wiring. The fire had been extinguished before the men arrived and no material damage was done; one to the Furniture Exchange at corner of Fir and Jefferson avenues caused by fire in rubbish at rear of building. No damage of any consequence. One to Fir and Madison Avenue, caused by burning rubbish supposed to be started by spark from engine. No damage. One to Sawyer-Holmes warehouse. This fire originated in some hay in a box car back of the building. The fire had gathered considerable headway when the department arrived and was entering the warehouse through the rear door. There was not much loss to the building from fire but some damage to the contents from water. The amount has not been ascertained as yet. At this time a fire broke out also at the Grande Ronde Lumber company's plant in some wood piled on the grounds. There was only slight loss.
From the Police Department, three arrests; one for traffic violations and two for juvenile delinquency. The fines collected were \$7.50 and pound fees \$1.00.
The street force have been employed in the usual cleaning of streets. Some crosswalks have been repaired and some gravel hauled on the main-dam streets. Old lumber from crosswalks was also hauled to the pound.
The water force has been busy with repairs and other work on the system, three leaks in the mains being repaired during the week. The fence at reservoir has been repaired and the place locked to keep stock and other intruders out. The men taken to the intake have completed the road to be used for hauling supplies from the cabin to the intake and are now clearing rock and other obstruction from the Beaver creek road. Two loads of cement and the same amount of sand have been delivered at the cabin. We have word that Mr. Koles will be in La Grande Friday of this week and hope at that time to decide just what work is to be done at the intake.
We have advertised for bids on the work to be done at the intake tank and hope to have some this evening. Work is progressing on the grading on Walnut street and the other street improvements asked for are being lined up as fast as possible. Estimates of the cost of painting the city building, making a detention room for women and a store-room for supplies show the cost will be about \$25.00.
