### LOCAL HAPPENINGS

**Text Books Delayed.**—County School Superintendent Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe received yesterday morning a notification from J. K. Gill & Co. of Portland, that on account of the strikes and labor situation in the east the following text books will be somewhat delayed: Baker and Thorndike Every Day Readers, 4th, 7th and 8th; Gordy's American Beginnings in Europe; Gordy's Stories of American History; Hughes' Civics; Davis' Productive Farming; Macco School History of the United States; New Word Speller, Nos. 1, 2 and 3. There will also be a delay in the high school books, Clippinger's English, Spoken and Written; Payne's Literary Readings. Advice was received that these books would be shipped about August 30. In the meantime, Mrs. Ivanhoe says, the schools will have to try and get along with the books they have until the regular text books arrive.

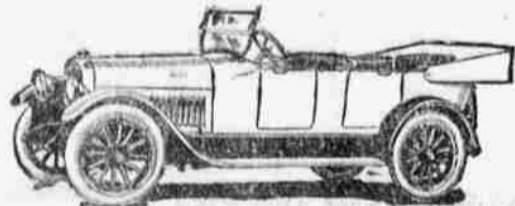
