#### Mica

Mica, so named from its being easily divided into gleaming scales, consists of silica and aluminum, associated with magnesia, soda and lime in varying proportions. There are also potash mica, consisting of silica, aluminum and potash; and muscovite mica, in which the aluminum is partially replaced by magnesium, pushing up the proportion of magnesia increases—this mica, which is chiefly composed of silica and magnesia.

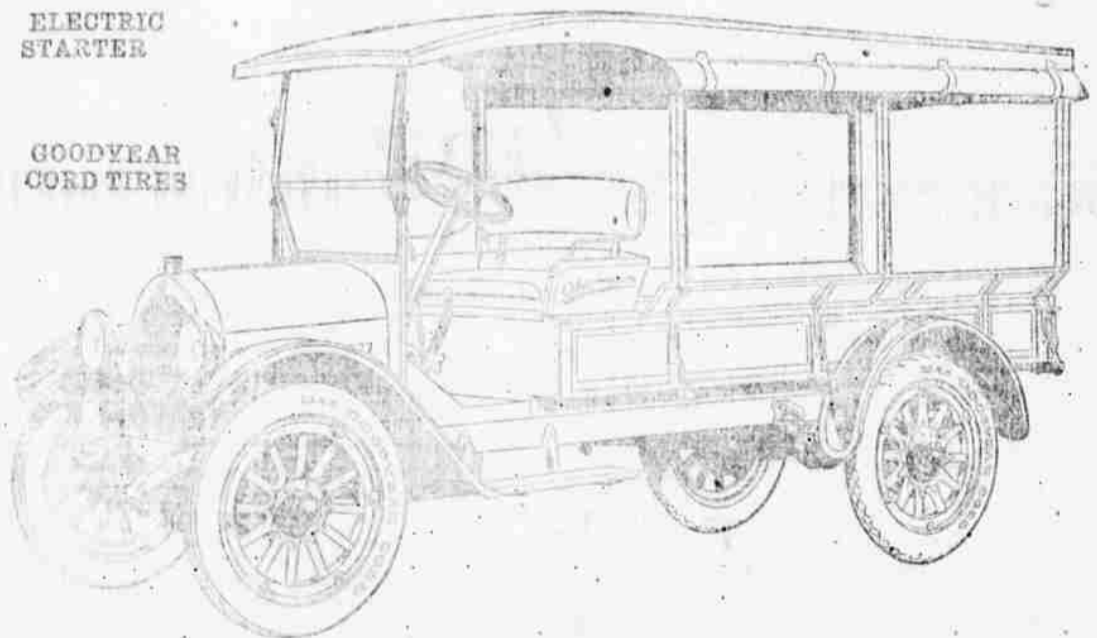
