OREGON INCOME TAX RETURNS SHOW VAST INCREASE IN YEAR

OREGON INCOME NO 12

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—Oregon is one of the 28 states which show a greater sum collected from income and excess profits for the fiscal year ended June 30 than for the preceding year. The collections for the last years were \$12,750,223.12, a gain of \$2,680,143.66.

The fact that collections in some states fell off, with the rates of taxation were increased, is explained when it is remembered that the 1918 figures include the total taxes for the year, while in the last year the law permitted payment in four

installments, only two of which had been collected when the fiscal year ended. The gain in Oregon is proportionately large when this is considered.
