BAKER RECEIVES CAR LOAD FISH SHIPMENT

BAKER, September 18.—One carload of rainbow and eastern brook trout reached Baker yesterday morning for distribution throughout this section, according to Deputy Game Warden I. B. Hazeltine. Seventy-five of the finny tribe were taken from the car at North Powder by Forest Supervisor Evans of the local office, and they will be taken by packhorse to North Powder and Van Patten lakes. A crowd of Duikis sportsmen met the train here and took 40 or 50 cans to that place for distribution. Ten thousand fish have been asked for by Arthur Oliver for his private pond, and Mr. Hazeltine will supply them if possible. The remainder will be taken to Sumpter to be placed in the streams near here.

Mr. Hazeltine left last evening for Bonneyville, where he will consult with State Game Warden Shoemaker relative to the establishment of two or more hatcheries in Baker and Grant counties. It is impossible for the Sumpter Valley railroad to carry the fish from Sumpter, and as a result the only salvation of the Grant county people is the placing of a hatchery in that section.

Several Indians were arrested last week in Gilliam and Morrow counties by the deputy warden on the charge of hunting and fishing without a license. It appears that the county clerks in those counties were misinformed as to the law relating to licensing Indians, inasmuch as they did not think that they needed them.

NEW WALNUT RECORD IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16.—California will produce 46,000,000 pounds of walnuts this year, according to the estimate of W. T. Webber, secretary of the California Walnut Growers association, who has just completed a survey of the state. This would establish a new record. The state's yield in 1918 was 29,600,000 and in 1917 was 22,000,000. Peaches on this season's crop will be fixed October 1. It is expected the value of the crop will aggregate \$13,000,000 or more.
