

Criteria of Elegance in Suits



If women ever wavered in their allegiance to the tailor-made suit for street wear they have repented—not in sackcloth and ashes, but by returning with more devotion than ever to the favorite garb of Americans. Now that fur capes and scarfs provide so much casual grace, along with extra warmth the women of our land are apparelled according to their hearts' desire and no one can study them on the streets without appreciating how well the combination suits them. The luxurious note introduced by these fur pieces is just the addition needed by the plain, tailored suit. In the depth of winter we shall see muffs and hats to match these neckpieces. In such an outfit beauty will go beautifully dressed for some months. In suits as in tailored hats, the line's the thing that is to be emphasized. Decorations are to be sparingly used and are best when they enhance the tailored finish which is the crowning glory of suits. An illustration of this appears in the picture above. These

suits are made of wool velours or broadcloth with plain skirts. In one of them the skirt is shoe top length and in the other it is two inches longer. Both coats are three-quarter length; one of them double-breasted with collar of gray squirrel. This coat has a narrow belt of the material, that terminates at each side in a button, and plain coat sleeves with turned back cuffs of squirrel fur. But the finishing touches that will cause the tailor-made admirer to doze upon this suit lie in the small slit pockets, joined to flap pockets by six pin tucks laid in the material with perfect precision.

There is a similar bit of clever finishing in the other suit where tabs, with parallel rows of stitching, are extended above the large, flat pockets. The sleeves have a small stitched panel set in, and rows of buttons with simulated buttonholes.

Cure for Poison Ivy. Mrs. Evelyn S. Trenbath, wife of the Rev. Robert W. Trenbath, rector of St. James' Episcopal church of Montclair, N. J., has conferred a boon on sufferers from poison ivy by announcing a remedy which those who have tried it say is a most efficacious remedy. It is simply the green leaves of common catnip rubbed on the affected parts until the juice runs.

This never fails, Mrs. Trenbath says, no matter how advanced the case may be, and is simple to use, especially in the case of children. The plant grows usually in great abundance behind old barns, and is said to be so antagonistic to the ivy that if planted near it the ivy disappears.

Volcano That Emits Lava. The following is reported by an observer in Hawaii: Tremendous changes are in progress at Kilauea, and there is no indication whatsoever of any cessation of the monumental rising of the entire vast lava column. Over the southwest brink a wide stream of glistening lava is sluggishly flowing in the direction of the Kulu desert, not with the spectacular cascading torrents of the southeastern flows of last March, but with a steady, stealthy gliding, which gains ground slowly at its base, but which piles up into tremendous masses from its source forward.

Dry Lead for Batteries. A dry battery utilizing red lead, instead of the usual manganese compound, has been patented by H. Czanyi. It is claimed that the red lead battery lasts longer than the type now in vogue, may be kept inactive for months without any deterioration and may be recharged at least ten times, with each recharge as efficient as any present battery.

To Save Charred Documents. Documents that have been charred by fire are rendered readable if collodion is poured over the charred paper. In a few minutes this dries and a tough, transparent coating is produced through which the printing can be seen. Bank notes and other papers thus charred have been treated in this way with success.

Permanent Colors. Ancient Egyptians had a marvelous knowledge of dyes, and they understood fully what colors would last. In the Egyptian palette the ground colors are as good as ever they were. The Egyptians worked their outlines in Jamblack, used clay for their whites, ferruginous earths for their reds, ochres for their yellows, and for green they used perhaps green Jasper or mixed blue carbonate or copper with ochre. All these colors are permanent.
