Norway, on February 18, 1862. When 20 years of age she came to America, and settled in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, where in 1885 she was married to Peter Nelson. It was in 1895 that she and her husband moved to Perry, and from Union county they went to Hood River, where they lived until 1917. Since that time they have made their home in Silverthorn.

She is the mother of six children, Martha and Nora deceased; Gilbert of Quincy, Calif.; and Nels E. of Hood River; and Sigurd and Louise M. of Silverthorn. Mrs. Nelson also leaves two brothers, Ben Gilbertson, and Gustav Gilbertson, both of Quincy, Calif.

The funeral services were held in the St. John's Lutheran church, of which she was a member, on Sept. 7, and she was laid to rest in the Silverthorn cemetery.
