Two American and One Russian Fast Off Siberian Coast.

NOME, Alaska, Sept. 25.—Three steamers, the American trader Delvedere, the Russian steamer Stavanpol, and another American steamer whose name could not be made out, are caught in the ice at the entrance of Kolyuchan bay, on the coast of Siberia, according to a wireless message received here Tuesday from P. M. Alexander, a trader at Anadyr, a Siberian point.

Alexander urged that a United States revenue cutter be sent from here to help the steamers. If they are not pulled out soon they will be forced to spend the winter in the ice, he said.

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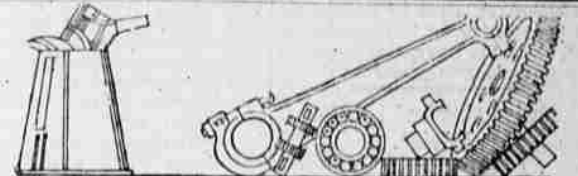
WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—With
