EVERY SCHOOL GETS PLAYERS

DENVER, COLO., Sept. 23.—Football candidates at the Colorado School of Mines, Colorado College and Colorado Agricultural College have responded to the initial call of the coaches for light work-outs.

In quantity, according to followers of the game, every school has the largest number of candidates in prospect in its history. The School of Mines will have a number of freshmen who may provide plenty of excitement for the other eleven. A number of southern football stars have registered at Golden to take the new courses dealing with oil shales.

The Mines squad of thirty-eight men began its work-out last week. Coach Ralph Glaze was highly pleased with the work of his charges but declared his team will probably be the lightest in the history of the institution. However, Severini and McGlone two giant freshmen, Glaze declared, will steady the line.

Boss Parsons, new coach at Colorado College, arrived in Colorado Springs Tuesday morning, and before night he had an even dozen candidates going through on a light drill. Captain Earl McTavish and his brother, together with Taylor, last season's quarterback, look as good as ever, Parsons declared. A number of last year's men will arrive at Colorado Springs next week.

Practice began at Fort Collins on Monday last. Among the men who are virtually assured of positions on the Agricultural college eleven are Worthington, center; Donaldson, quarterback; Scott, fullback; Bresnahan and Hartshorn, halfbacks; Nye, end; Dotson and Leiby, line.

Practice has not started at the University of Colorado at Denver University. Boulder registration does not take place until Sept. 29.

Montana Farmers Go to Nebraska to Help Harvest Wheat Crop

LINCOLN, NEBR., Sept. 22.—A special train chartered by the farm bureau of Cheyenne county, Nebraska, brought 275 farmers to this state from the vicinity of Great Falls, Montana, to help with the Nebraska wheat harvest.

The great majority of men coming were farmers who had suffered the loss of crops through the drought of the past three years. Most of them had families in Montana, and returned to that state at the end of the harvest season. Many were employed in the cutting, stacking, and shucking of grain, but will be given work as threshers and then will be employed in fall planting.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH LAUNCHES CAMPAIGN

Lewis B. Franklin, Liberty Loan Organizer, Selected as Director.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—With the selection of Lewis B. Franklin as director of organization, the Protestant Episcopal Church has secured the services of a man who is regarded as probably one of the most successful organization experts to-day in America. Franklin will have complete direction of the forthcoming "Every Name" campaign of the Episcopal Church, as part of the program of that church in America to stimulate and reawaken interest in Episcopal Church work.

Lewis B. Franklin is best known as the man who organized for the Treasury Department the machinery that conducted the four liberty loan campaigns and the victory loan campaign.

The enlistment of Franklin in the work of the Episcopal Church adds another result, from the ranks of leading men of affairs in New York and elsewhere, who have joined hand with the clergy to promote a practical, efficient religion to meet the present day demands.

Discussing the Episcopal movement Franklin said today: "The Episcopal Nation-Wide Campaign is a movement which, while not sacrificing one of its spiritual aims, seeks by coordination of effort and economic business administration and the recognition of the real fellowship of men emphasized by the war, to bring religion and the church into the closest touch with the spirit of the times."

The "Every Name" campaign of the Episcopal Church will culminate on December 7th when every person

whose name is enrolled on the membership of the church will be personally visited and urged to reawaken interest in church work, and the responsibilities of Christian citizenship in coping with the problems which the nation faces.

The special feature of his work in organizing the liberty loan drives which will make his services of the utmost value to the Nation-Wide and "Every Name" campaigns of the Church, is that it brought him into intimate touch with loan committees in all parts of the country. He has probably as wide a circle of acquaintances as any man in America, among the earnest men and women whose patriotic energy and zeal made the national campaigns so successful. At the heart of these campaigns, Mr. Franklin had an organization of over two million men and women enlisted in the work, while more than twenty million people became purchasers of the liberty bonds.

Franklin today discussed his plans for the big job he has undertaken.

"It seems to me," he said, "that the work here is similar to what was done in Washington in organizing for the loan campaigns. In those campaigns we made the Federal Reserve District the unit of organization; but in this campaign it is planned that the Diocese will have to be unit, I believe in the utmost measure of home role in connection with such work. The job of the central office is to help out in organizing the diocesan committees, advising and supplying speakers and information, but in each diocese the chosen leader ought to be active directing in accordance with local conditions. I see no reason why enthusiasm cannot be created for this splendid movement precisely as it was for the loans. The people will always respond where the cause is good, and I can see nothing that is not only good but necessary to the welfare of the whole people in a church movement which seeks to 'inform the mind and awaken the conscience' of the people for national betterment."

D'ANNUNZIO AT FUME

There is a latin touch of fire and sentiment in the story of Gabriele d'Annunzio's triumphant entry into Fiume, says the New York World. The poet, with forty motor lorries, was met at the gates of the city by Gen. Pittaluga with machine guns. "Thus you will ruin Italy!" said the General. It was easy for the poet to counter: it was the General who was "ruining Italy" by "opposing Fiume's destiny."

"I must obey orders," said the General finally. "I understand that you would fire upon your brethren! Fire first upon me!" With that d'Annunzio bared his poetic breast with a splendid gesture; and the General no longer able to resist the appeal of eloquence, replied: "With you, I cry 'Evviva Fiume!'" "Evviva Pittaluga!" shout the crusaders in return, as they sweep into the turbulent city.

Wherefore Premier Nitti is confronted with a grave task of explaining to a sensitive Italian Parliament that the situation is serious, because, for the first time, secession, "though for idealistic purposes," had entered the Italian army. "Lunatics, betraying the cause of the fatherland," were mixing things up badly in the city that has been the cause of so much diplomatic controversy.

D'Annunzio, who, before the war gave him a new reason for living, had announced that he was tired of life, would doubtless have welcomed a new Aspromonte, when he bared his breast at the gates of Fiume. And it never occurred to the brave General—for he also is a Latin, of a land where poets still have authority—to say: "I don't have to shoot you, I can put you in jail."

BULGARIA IN TRANQUIL STATE.

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)
 GENEVA, SWITZERLAND, Aug. 28.—Bulgaria is one of the most tranquil states in Europe today, says Ivan S. Guichev, formerly Bulgarian Minister of Foreign Affairs and now Minister to Switzerland.

Instead of resorting to revolution, the Bulgarians have returned to their farms and peaceful pursuits, believing this to be the only way of curing the ills caused by two successive wars, the Minister adds.

M. Guichev ascribes this peaceful internal condition and the opposition in Bulgaria to anarchistic or communist propaganda to the fact that the majority of the Bulgarian people, 85 per cent are peasants, owners of their own land and homes. This is sufficient, he says to show that the people so constituted as the Bulgarians are will always be averse to communist tendencies.

Another reason for internal peace is the fact that crops in Bulgaria have been good.

FOCH INSPIRED THE BRITISH

Had Defeated the Great Napoleon. Should They Yield to Lowly German?
 PARIS, (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—An appeal to the British soldiers defeated by the great Napoleon inspired them to remember their forefathers' victory over Napoleon inspired them to attack the Germans and recover the ground they had lost before the gas wave at the second battle of Ypres. Writes Colonel Peyler in the Journal De Geneve.

Before the sphyxinating gas both British and French had been obliged to give ground. The then General Foch intended to recover the for

mer positions. He was according to Colonel Peyler. He asked General Foch to cooperate with him. "Impossible," replied Foch, "my men are ready to hold here but I do not feel that I can demand of them in their present condition further sacrifice in attacking."

Foch expressed surprise: "Their morale is low," he said, "why don't you launch a proclamation? Something like this: 'British soldiers forward. You who have vanquished the great Napoleon, shall it come to pass that you will permit the lowly German to drive you from your positions and retain them?'"

"How is that?" asked Foch greatly interested. "Please repeat it." And at the dictation of Foch, French wrote out the proclamation which was given out to the troops the next day.

The next morning the British soldiers hit the line and recovered all the lost ground.
