

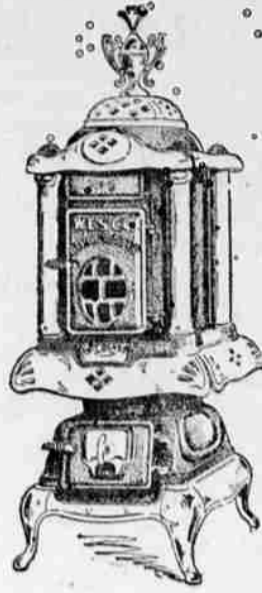
HEATING STOVES
