worthy of consideration, in other words, why throw away a quarter of a million dollars when there is a way to stop the loss. In this estimate, I have not taken into consideration the saving in time to the drivers or the comfort afforded the passengers by the completion of a good road system. The same lesson applies to tractors, and other road vehicles. All of these savings tend to add to the earning capacity of our citizens and the increased profit derived tends to elevate all values throughout the country. I have also taken into consideration the value to the community of the tourist traffic.

California is the greatest example of what "the tourist crop" as it is commonly called in that state, means to the resident public. California counts on the tourist crop with as much certainty as our farmers do their wheat crop. It means millions of dollars in come annually. We are in

direct line for this business if we but prepare for it. We can have it or not, just as we desire. We can get it by preparing the roads for it, or pass it up by announcing that we are coming along on that we do not care for it, by neglecting the bond issue.

A good road system will benefit each and every citizen in Union even if I have figured good roads only in the light of an investment. You can most assuredly class me with those in favor of good roads, and I regard it my duty to do all that I can to see that the bond issue carries when we come to vote, Saturday October 11th.

MUST RETURN THE STOLEN DYNAMOS

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN GERMANY, Aug. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—A report from Dresden says that the city power plant which employs more than a thousand men, may be forced to close within a few weeks, because under the terms of the peace treaty the German government is bound to return to France the stolen dynamo used in the plant. The superintendent has appealed to Berlin for substitute dynamo in order to provide power for Dresden.

ROBBERS KILL SHERIFF

Bandits Loot Bank at Smith Center, Kansas; Later Battle with Officers

GUIDE ROCK, Neb., Sept. 29.—Authorities at Guide Rock were notified Sunday that a bank at Smith Center, Kansas had been robbed some time Saturday, and in a fight with the robbers Sheriff O. H. Manger had been killed and another man wounded. Kansas officers asked the constable at Guide Rock to secure help and guard the bridge across the river near the state line as it was believed the robbers, two or three in number, were headed this

way. A message Sunday night from Superior, Nebraska, said an automobile answering the description of the one in which the robbers escaped from Smith Center had been found near there, badly wrecked. Five Smith county, Kansas, officers, the message said, were trailing the robbers.

Read This Carefully!

It will be seen by looking over the table of payments following this paragraph that the average increase of taxation per thousand dollars of assessed valuation of property is but a little more than four dollars. The first year the increase is but half a mill. The fourth year the increase is but two mills and the highest point reached is but six and a quarter mills. The roads will have begun to pay their way long before the high point has been reached. Remember, the bonds are paid out at the expiration of the twenty-year period. While we have twenty years in which to pay for the roads, we have the use of them from the time of their construction.
