## JUNIOR RED CROSS IS ENDORSED

President Wilson Issues Proclamation for Campaign Enrollment.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 29.—The Junior Red Cross, the organization which is the children's and teachers' department of the American Red Cross, received approval today from President Wilson, who has issued the following proclamation in relation to the enrollment campaign now being carried on:

To the School Children of the United States.

Two years ago, as President of the United States and as President of the American Red Cross, I addressed to you a letter in which I advised you to enroll in the newly organized Red Cross, and I explained to you some of the ways in which the Junior Red Cross would help you to be useful to your country and the children of other countries associated with us in a great war against a powerful enemy. Millions of you did join the Junior Red Cross and worked hard and what you did is warmly appreciated by the whole country.

Now, by the blessing of God, and through the faithful performance of duty by our soldiers and sailors and the soldiers and sailors of other countries by whose side we fought, a great victory has been won and the war is over, but I am sure that you wish to continue to be useful to your country and to children less fortunate than yourselves. Therefore, I am writing to you at the opening of the new school year to advise you again to join the Junior Red Cross, which has planned a work for peace times even larger and more systematic than the work done during the war.

The Junior Red Cross will instruct you in ideals and habits of service, will show you how to be useful to your school, how to aid the other peo-

ple in your community in their efforts to promote the health and comfort of the people among whom you live, and how to help the children who are still suffering from the effects of the great war in foreign lands invaded by the enemy.

The recent war was the greatest of all wars, not only because more men and nations were engaged in it than in any other war of history, but also because, as a result of it, people have seen a vision of a different kind of world from the world of the past, a world in which nations shall unite for purposes of peace and good will and they formerly united only for war against an armed foe. In working for the children of other nations you will come to understand them better and they will understand and appreciate you the more.

Your education will not be complete unless you learn how to be good citizens, and the Junior Red Cross plans to teach you simple lessons of citizenship through its organization and its activities. It is your generation which must carry on the work of our generation at home and abroad and you cannot begin too soon to train your minds and habits for this responsibility. By doing what you can to make happier the people of your own neighborhood, your state, your country and also the people of other lands, you will make yourselves happier.

## McADOO ON ROOSEVELT.

Pays High Tribute to Fighting Qualities of the Ex-President.

Theodore Roosevelt incarnated the fighting spirit of America. He did not snuff the battle from afar. He drank deeply of its fire at the storm's center. Whether upon the field of war or in the political arena, he struck with mighty blows. He preferred the battle-axe to the sledge because he could cut deeper, and the trip-hammer to the sledge because he could hit harder. It was his impetuous courage, his ready acceptance of every challenge, his fighting quality, that captivated the popular imagination and welded to him, as with thongs of steel, a great body of supporters whose loyalty to him was phenomenal, and who followed him in every fight and whose ever he led with a faith and devotion which were in themselves the highest personal tribute. No quality of Mr. Roosevelt's made a stronger appeal to his countrymen than his fighting spirit and robust patriotism, and as long as men live and love courage, he will have a secure place in the hearts of mankind.

More than any man in our history, Mr. Roosevelt, in his fundamental characteristics, resembles Andrew Jackson. Like Jackson, he was a fighter; like Jackson, he believed absolutely that what he stood for was right; like Jackson, he thought that everybody who was opposed to him was

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wrong; like Jackson, he was impatient of red tape and undeterred by obstacles; like Jackson, he incurred bitter enemies and attracted passionate friendships; like Jackson, he was arbitrary, but he was forceful and compelling. I recall the interesting fact that Mr. Roosevelt once told me in the White House of his profound admiration of Jackson, which was not unnatural, since they were so much alike in their general attributes.

Mr. Roosevelt had punch and personality which made him immensely popular as an orator. He was also very human, and his robustness and ready accessibility endeared him to the public.

Like all men of genius, Mr. Roosevelt had his eccentricities, and like all men of impetuous force, his judgments were not always right. He could not have been human if he had been infallible. No one will claim infallibility for Mr. Roosevelt, or for any man, and while it was not always possible to agree with his views and policies, no one could be so particular or blind as to deny his great virtues or to give just recognition to the invaluable services he rendered to his country.

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## PERSHING AND SIMS ADDRESS CONVENTION

Prominent Men to Attend Triennial Meeting of Episcopal Church.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 30.—General John J. Pershing, commander of the American expeditionary forces in France, and Admiral William S. Sims, who had command of the American

fleets in European waters during and after the war, are expected to address the delegates to the triennial general convention of the Episcopal church here on October 9.

The convention, which will open October 8, will be attended, it is anticipated by 3000 delegates and hotel and other accommodations for that number have been arranged.

The evening of October 9 an open meeting will be held for the discussion of the general subject, "The Meaning of the War to the Church and the World," and the two leading warriors of the United States in the world conflict are expected to participate in this discussion.

Other prominent men who are expected to attend and address the convention include Bishop Charles H. Brent, chaplain-general of the American expeditionary forces; Archbishop Platon, metropolitan of Kherson and Odessa, Russia; Judge Packard, of Maryland; Bradford Prince, of Texas; Bishop Peter T. Rowe, of Alaska; Rev. William T. Manning, rector of Trinity Church, New York; Rev. James T. Freeman, St. Mark's Church, Minneapolis; the Right Rev. William Lawrence, Bishop of Massachusetts, who will preach the consecration sermon in St. Paul's cathedral October 12, and bishops, clergy and delegates from China, Japan, the Philippines, Liberia, Cuba, Haiti and South America.

Several social features in honor of General Pershing and other prominent visitors are being arranged.
