Notice is hereby given to all concerned that the Commission of the city of La Grande, Oregon, intends and proposes to improve Improvement District No. 191 in said city, which Improvement District is bounded as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the center of the intersection of Elm street and Adams Avenue in Chaplin's Addition to the Town of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, and running thence southeasterly along the center-line of said Adams Avenue to the center of the intersection of Adams Avenue and Fir street in said Chaplin's Addition, thence southeasterly along the center-line of Fir street to the center of the intersection of Fir street and Washington Avenue, thence northwesterly along the center-line of Washington Avenue to the center of the intersection of Washington Avenue and Elm street and thence northwesterly along the center-line of Elm street to the place of beginning.

It will be seen by looking over the table of payments following this paragraph that the average increase of taxation per thousand dollars of assessed valuation of property is but a little more than four dollars. The first year the increase is but half a mill. The fourth year the increase is but two mills and the highest point reached is but six and a quarter mills. The roads will have begun to pay their way long before the high point has been reached. Remember, the bonds are paid out at the expiration of the twenty-year period. While we have twenty years in which to pay for the roads, we have the use of them from the time of their construction.
