A large community Methodist church is being constructed in the business portion of Astoria.

The Country Gentleman of the current week has a "write-up" on Tillamook Cheese, an industry that has reached a volume exceeding \$6,000,000 per annum.

Commercial fishermen of the mid-Columbia have ended their work for this season. The salmon catch was unusually heavy.

Herbert Savage and Philip Ringle, members of the 162d Infantry, have returned to Salem after passing 20 months in France and Germany.

Twelve hundred dollars for road construction work between McKenzie bridge and Foley Springs has been authorized by the forestry department.

At a conference Wednesday the differences between the Port of Astoria and the Longshoremen's union were adjusted and the men are again at work.

NEW RELIGIOUS ORDER ARISES IN RUSSIA

LONDON, Sept. 2.—A religious order has been formed at Omsk, named after St. Hermogenes, ancient patriarch of Moscow, who, in troublous times in the past, aroused the people of Russia to fight the enemies of the country.

The intended activities of the Order are varied and include the formation of detachment of "Crusaders" to

These troops are united by the idea that the conflict with Bolshevism is the war of Christianity against hostile forces and the cross, worn by every Crusader, is symbolical of this idea. The Crusaders also, besides being obedient to ordinary military discipline, are subject to special regulations, according to which the slightest act of insubordination constitutes a breach of honor.

The chiefs are appointed by the high command, and the founder of the order include, not only priests, but also professors, politicians and men of letters.

ONE-FIFTH OF SERBIANS DIED DURING THE WAR

BELGRADE, Aug. 20.—One-fifth of the population of Serbia, or about 800,000 persons, perished from all causes during the war. Typhus alone claimed about 300,000 of these. No figures have yet been furnished by the Serbian War Department as to

the number of deaths in the army. It is known that the total number of men mobilized was 700,000. Of this number 300,000 were combatant troops and 400,000 were used in various auxiliary services. About 300,000 Serbians were interned in Bulgaria during the war, and of these about one-half are believed to have perished, according to the report of the Inter-Allied Commission.

FRENCH STILL SHY OF GERMANS

PARIS, Sept. 4.—The impending resumption of commercial relations with the enemy of yesterday is causing the French public at large a good deal of misgiving. Many would keep the German out at all cost, but cooler heads realize that France cannot afford to close the door upon a customer of a billion francs annually. There is, however, a fairly unanimous feeling that if the German is to come back to France, he must come back in some recognizable shape and not disguised, as too often before.

Incidents such as the following do not serve to put the public mind at ease. A woman of good social standing of Lille recognized yesterday, in the person of a cashier in one of the big department stores of Paris, a former German officer. She had good reason to remember him as one of the invaders who had been quartered upon her home in Lille.

Challenged as to his identity, the man stoutly denied his Teutonic nationality. He spoke French perfectly; his papers were to all appearance in order, and the accusation at first found scant credence on the part of the management. Then he remembered that the man, had once boastfully exhibited his arm, on which the portrait of the former German emperor was tattooed. The cashier-officer was dismissed and the newspapers are now demanding that employers shall be held responsible for the civil status of their employees.
