Club Owner Reap Profit Further delving into the figures shows that the club owners have profited to a greater extent than the players for the sums divided among the competing clubs and the league during the past fourteen years reach as the pleasing total of \$1,715,799, while the baseball workers have collected \$1,376,208.

TO THE VOTERS OF UNION COUNTY, OREGON

"On October 11, 1919, we will vote upon the question of bonding Union county for better roads. I certainly trust every voter will very carefully consider, not only his own personal interests, but his neighbor's likewise, before he casts his vote on that day.

"Remember that the day of horse transportation is past. Everyone who does not now own an auto or truck expects to do so. The life of a car will be more than doubled if we can have the roads which the bond issue will bring. This alone will pay your share of the tax many times over. The auto owner is already paying heavy taxes. Three-fourths of Union county's auto license money will be spent outside of Union county for which we will receive no gain except as we go out side to use the roads of other counties, if the bond issue loses.

"About ninety percent of this auto license money which will come back to us will be paid to Union county men—by no means a small item of consideration to the man who labors, as well as to the man who owns. In addition to the money coming from the state, about ninety per cent of the \$1,500,000 bond issue will be paid in Union county.

"The money that will be saved in time-time in marketing the produce of the farms will alone pay the taxes that you vote many times each year.

"It will bring every market nearer it will add to the value of every acre of Union county land. You are paying one-half the tax anyway, if you own a car, and if you do not you will get all of the returns—the profits—of the roads.

COAL MINERS ARE OPPOSED TO INTERVENTION

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 3.—The conference of coal operators and miners of the central competitive field Thursday afternoon took a recess until next Thursday, when it will reconvene in Philadelphia. The operators wanted to meet in Washington, but the miners were opposed to this plan.

The desire of the operators to meet in Washington, it was intimated, was based on their belief that ultimately the government must take a hand in the wage scale negotiations if a strike of the 400,000 miners, set for November 1, is to be avoided. The miners were outspoken in their opposition to federal intervention, holding that the issues at stake lie between operators and their employees.

The recess was taken upon the recommendation of the sub-committee, which was in secret session Thursday.
