**RESPONSIBILITY OF WORLD'S NATIONS**  
America, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa Have Great Power.

(Correspondence to The Associated Press.)

LONDON, Sept. 9.—"If mankind is to move forward in step, America, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, each in their own sphere must contribute their stream of effort and illumination to the common pool," says the Round Table in discussing the responsibility of the nations for the future of the world.

"What that meant in practice we can not now do more than mention," the editor continues. "That it means the acceptance of large mandatory responsibilities by America goes without saying. A nation of 100,000,000 possessed of far greater wealth than any other in the world, continues self-centered in her own home and grow to the full stature of national manhood.

"America laid herself open to the charge of selfish indifference to anything but her own interests by the slowness with which she recognized her duty in the war, and the consequently small sacrifice which she made for the cause of human freedom.

"She is now showing a similar readiness to try to escape from practical responsibility for the unfortunate people not yet able to stand alone, and consequently leave them to be exploited, and in some cases massacred, by people in no way qualified to have control of them. America will doubtless rise rapidly to a sense of her responsibility, but it is a regret that she should be delayed.

"The problems of the world are different. They piled their burdens during the war. All of them except Canada have now assumed responsibility for the world's people."

**MAKE MINAM LAKE STORAGE RESERVOIR**  
Farmers Change Outlet to South Fork By Means of Two Cams and Long Flume

A picturesque and valuable development project is approaching completion at Minam lake, which Louisiana farmers have converted into a storage reservoir, to hold water for late irrigation of their rich valley land. A dam 19 feet high has been constructed at each end of the reservoir which will mean the holding of much more water in the beautiful mountain lake than nature intended; and the water will be taken out of the South Fork end, instead of flowing through the natural channel to the Minam river. Water will be drawn off thru a 19-foot flume, 99 feet long, which will start it down the stream to Loring.

What makes the work picturesque is the fact that the wagon road up the South Fork ends 19 miles short of the lake, and all supplies have been taken the remainder of the way on pack animals. Materials for the work, and tools and camp equipment have been packed on all summer long. M. O. Courtney has the contract for the construction work.

Next summer it is expected that a waterman will be kept at the lake to look after dams and flume. He will have comfortable quarters in a cabin, and if he is any good as an angler, he will have plenty of trout to eat, for the lake is stocked with game fish.—Record-Chiefman.

**URGENT BEPUSH TIME TO LEWISTON**

Flying into the county above the clouds of the Walla Walla over the airship of the South Airzette company reached Enterprise late Monday afternoon for the fair. Since then it has

been a star attraction in beautiful exhibition flights, says the Record-Chiefman.

A landing field for the craft has been selected on W. P. Craig's farm west of town, and all flights are made from there. An exhibition flight is given each afternoon about the fair grounds.

It had been expected that the craft would fly from the fair grounds, as the crowd always is anxious to see it rise into the air and then return to earth. But the pilot and the owners insisted that the oval within the race track did not give a straight away course half long enough. The matter was discussed with the executive committee of the fair association and the airman had to have their way.

An experiment yesterday demonstrated to the pilot that he could not carry passengers when flying from this altitude. As the air is lighter here than at sea level, the ship does not rise easily. Two men in it proved a good deal of a load, from a standpoint, and so the idea of carrying passengers was given up, after a good list of applications had been received.

However a passenger may go thru all this if he wishes, and so informs the pilot before starting, the charge then being double price, or \$30.

Four men accompany the airship: Lieut. H. P. Parrish, late of the army aviation corps, who is pilot; H. Kauton, mechanic, and J. W. Smith and E. V. Catterlin of Walla Walla, owners. They also have with them an expert repairman brought in a hurry from Walla Walla to attend to a minor break caused by landing in Enterprise on road.

Last week the craft showed at the Lewiston fair. With their next engagement at Enterprise, the pilot and mechanic rose into the air at Lewiston at about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon and headed up Snake river. The atmosphere was thick with dust, so the men could see only a short distance ahead. So they flew low, keeping the river always in sight, sailing along in the great canyon.

A few miles above Astoria they turned west, and followed the Grande Ronde river to its junction with the Walla walla, which stream guided them up to Enterprise. It is figured that the distance covered was about 140 miles, and the time was an hour and 50 minutes, or 145 miles in 110 minutes. This is certainly much the quickest trip ever made between Lewiston and Enterprise, and could be cut down to an hour by taking the direct route.
