NORTH POWDER, Oct. 12.—(Special)—The North Powder foot ball team cleaned up the Baker team with all ease last Saturday, the game was fast from the very start. One of the Baker boys charged into one of the home team and suffered a broken leg as the consequence. The Baker team was outclassed in the beginning but put up a hard fight. The boys feel proud of their victory and are planning to win several more.

PORTLAND SHOPS TURN OUT NEW CARS

At the rate of 10 and 12 cars a day, the Pacific Car & Foundry company is turning out hundreds of cars for the United States railroad administration for allotment to the lines of the Pacific Northwest. The output is in about equal volume at the Portland shops and the Seattle plant, according to James Twohy, an executive of the company who is in Portland today.

The total order is for 2000 standard freight cars and the last car will be delivered about February 1. Quantities of fir lumber are used in the construction of the bodies which are on steel frames and regulation trucks.

Besides this activity of the Twohy interests they have an extensive shipbuilding plant on Puget sound and two railroad construction contracts in the Southwest, a line for a copper mining company in Arizona and another in Texas for an oil company.—Telegram.
