Multnomah leads other counties with 486 registrations, Benton county coming second with 444. Marion county is represented by 167 students and Linn by 101. California leads all other states in number of students in the college with 207, Washington being a close second with 191. Idaho has 68, Montana 22, and the Philippine Islands 14. Other states and territories represented are Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, District of Columbia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia and Wyoming.

Canada leads the foreign countries in registration with 13 students, two come from India, two from Scotland, one from Spain, one from the Netherlands and one from China. Three New Zealanders were represented in the summer session.

SAGAMORE HILL TO BE ONE SHRINE

Qualities Exemplified in the Person of Roosevelt Add Weight to Memorial.

What does it mean to the nation, this organization which proposes to erect memorials for Roosevelt?

It means the same thing that was meant when those who followed Washington labored to make the idea of love of liberty universal.

It means the same thing that was meant when those who followed Lincoln did all in their power to further national unity.

It means that those who understood and believed the Roosevelt doctrine of progress are now beginning a campaign for the propagation of national purity, honesty and courage.

There will be no miracle of swift understanding among the people, no sudden acceptance of ideas. The up building of the nation along these lines must come through gradual education. There may be, and no doubt will be, sporadic cases of the old revival spirit that will sweep certain sections. Under the fervor of such excitement many will swear allegiance to truth, honesty, unselfish loyalty and higher Americanism, who will later fall before the onslaught of expediency, timidity and cupidity, but many will abide.

This war has taught much of national duty and has awakened a soul that was still in the fog and darkness of an old life it sought to leave. Now is the time to take up the task of showing to these souls that what they have seen is not merely a flash of vanishing light, but the first gleam of a better day in America.

From the foundation already laid, it is proposed to build a more solid and permanent structure of national life. Through a steady, unswerving devotion to an idea, to bring about righteousness through education, until it will become the national habit.

No man whose soul is clean will ever deny the advantage of plain understandings and honesty in public as well as private life. The square deal will be used and taught until dishonesty has been driven out of municipal, state and national life.

No real American will ever dispute the wholesomeness of the idea that those permanently in America must be Americanized. So will the ideals and ideas of our nation at its best be taught by the society and influence of one who was long the apostle of true Americanism constantly presented. The monument and the park will be reminders to every thinking person who views them, of the faith of Roosevelt in his nation and his love for her.

As Mt. Vernon has been the shrine of liberty, so will Sagamore Hill become the shrine of public honesty and truth.

It is good to remember the good it is helpful to recall the men who stood for the best in their day. David stands out like a giant among the puny of his day. St. Paul's record shines like the glory of the morning sun. Luther, Knox, Washington, Lincoln, Roosevelt, stand as beacon lights, waving against the shoals and rocks, beckoning to the safe harbors.

This organization means the strengthening of the nation through the promulgation of truth and righteousness. Courage, honesty, truth, purity of life, as exemplified in the person of Roosevelt, will aid in the immortalization of America. Rome died of immorality. The United States of America has been shown life everlasting through a strict code of morals. The Roosevelt Memorial Association will do its part towards the national acceptance of that code.

Edwin Drake bored the first oil well, and before the end of the year Drake, under the firm name of Drake & Bowditch, bored through the rock at Titusville to a depth of 70 feet and struck an oil well that yielded 1,000 gallons a day. This discovery started the enormous oil industry in northwestern Pennsylvania.

Wm. B. Sargent, a member of the bar of this county and state died in La Grande, Oregon, September 3rd, 1919. Brother Sargent was born at Fort Edwards, New York, October 4th, 1867. He is survived by his widow, Moina Sargent, a son, Howard I. Sargent, age 8 years, Helen C. Sargent, age 6 years, Merrill F. Sargent, age 2 years, and Wm. D. Sargent, a son by former marriage, age 26 years. Brother Sargent was admitted to the bar of this state May 3rd, 1897, since which date he was a member of the bar of this county, having his offices at La Grande, Oregon. Brother Sargent was at all times true to his clients, courteous to the court, and accommodating to the members of the bar with whom he came in contact in his profession. He was a man of more than ordinary business ability, and was largely instrumental in organizing and building up the La Grande Investment company, one of the leading real estate and insurance agencies in this part of the state. He was public spirited and identified himself with every movement in and about La Grande for the upbuilding and betterment of the community. He was a good citizen, and in his home life was a

Sargent the bar of this county has lost a most valuable member, the community a valuable citizen and his wife and children a lovable and faithful provider, and an affectionate and indulgent husband and father.

Be it further resolved, that out of respect for his memory this court stand adjourned until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, and that these resolutions be spread upon the journal of this court, and a copy be furnished his widow, and to the press for publication.

John T. Baker died at La Grande, Oregon, September 13, 1919, at the ripe age of 81 years, 5 months and 15 days. He had been jury bailiff of the circuit court of this county for a number of years. He was born in Fairfield, Iowa, March 28,

1838. He came with his wife and family to Oregon in September, 1867, and settled at La Grande, Oregon, where he continued to reside until the time of his death. His wife died September 7th, 1912. He had eight children, only three of whom survive him, namely: Mrs. Adla Childers, of La Grande, Oregon; Mrs. Rita Wines, of Portland, Oregon; and Mr. Charles Baker of La Grande, Oregon. Mr. Baker was not only one of the pioneers of this county, but was a brother of the late M. Baker, one of the pioneer lawyers of Eastern Oregon, who all of the elder members of the bar remember with great respect. Mr. Baker was a very faithful public official, attentive to the court and the duties in his charge. Since the death of his wife he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Adla Childers, the widow of Frank P. Childers, deceased, late sheriff of

Union county, Oregon. He was ever an affectionate, indulgent husband and father, and a good all round man.

Be it therefore resolved, that the bar and court of this county, in the death of John T. Baker, have lost a faithful officer and public servant, who always had a friendly word for the court and the members of the bar, and was to his children an affectionate father, and to the community a good citizen.

Be it further resolved, that out of respect to his memory this court now stands adjourned until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, and that these resolutions be spread upon the journal of this court and a copy be furnished Mrs. Adla Childers and the city press for publication.
