Red Cross Commission Sent to Buda

pest at Request of Inter-Allied

Board at Paris.

PARIS, Sept. 21.—(By Mail).—

Hungary is the first of the late Cen

tral Powers to receive an official com

mission of the American Red Cross

for civilian work. To meet the ur

gent demand for medical and surgical

supplies in the hospitals of Budapest,

a train of 30 cars in charge of a unit

of twelve American officers, has been

sent from Paris. The supplies car

ried are valued at \$35,000.

The unit is in charge of Major S. A.

Moffatt, of Brooklyn and Major B. B.

Metheny, of Seattle, both of whom

have had long experience in relief

work in France. The transportation

is under Captain H. H. Kidder, of

Marshall, Washington, and the per

sonnel is under Captain Howard Arm

strong of Buffalo. Other members of

the unit are: Lieutenant John A. Lang

ston of Cleburne, Texas; Lieutenant

Frederick H. Mead, of Troy, N. Y.;

Lieutenant William Hagie, of Troy,

New York; Lieutenant L. E. Walsh, of

Amherst, Mass.; Lieutenant V. J. Old

shue, of Pittsburgh; and Sergeant R.

D. Heimbach, of San Francisco.

The commission was sent to Buda

pest at the request of the Inter-Allied

Commission in Paris. Hospitals in

Budapest were reported as crowded

to overflowing but without the barest

necessities. A report on the situation

in Budapest, sent to Paris by one of

the advance agent of the American

Red Cross says:

"Hungary today seems the least

able of any of the defeated nations

to right itself and resume its place

among the people of the world. Buda

pest, the capital, finds itself face

to face with famine, its citizens lacking

not only food, coal and clothing, but

its sick dying for want of medicines

and the means for surgeons to oper

ate.

"The hospitals still have hundreds

of wounded men, but most of the pa

tients are civilian sick, men, women

and children, whose constitutions have

been undermined by war. Sugar, milk,

cocoa, chocolate and other delicacies

so necessary for the upbuilding of the

sick are practically unobtainable."
